Motorists Urged To Slow **Down In School Zones**

be held near the intersection of Decatur and Bonanza on Wednesday, August 23 at 9:30 a.m. The school crossing is near Ruth Fyfe Elementary School, 4101 W. Bonanza.

The primary purpose of the news conference is to stress traffic safety for motorists when traveling through school speed zones and to highlight the new Volunteer Crossing Guard Program.

Parents from the Fyfe PTA will bring children to the conference site to enact school crossings for media camera crews.

A crossing guard will also be there to assist students across this intersection. This school crossing, as others throughout Clark County, has flashing warning lights in addition to signs that warn motorists they are approaching a school

Fyfe is one of two Clark County elementary schools that are participating in a new Volunteer Crossing Guard Program, coordinated by Metro.

A back-to-school safety news conference will
Under the new program, schools with intersections that do not qualify for paid Metro Crossing Guards may participate in the volunteer program. Fyfe has a paid crossing guard at the Decatur/Bonanza intersection. Volunteer crossing guards are used at another nearby intersection.

> Uniformed officers of the Metro Police Department will be on hand to answer media questions about traffic violations in school zones. Motorists are reminded that only in the City of Las Vegas will motorists see school zone lights flashing continuously during the school day.

> Other city and county jurisdictions will turn off the flashers except when students would be walking to and from school. Although drivers will find some relief with faster movement in some school zones, when the lights are flashing, motorists must slow down to the school zone speed limit.

> All schools in the Clark County School District will resume classes for the 1995-96 school year on Monday, August 28.



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A campus-wide parking fee designed to raise funds for improved parking at the university will go into effect at UNLV on Sept. 1.

University faculty and staff will pay \$60 for annual permits; students will pay \$30 for annual permits. Permits are also available for nine months (August-May) or may be purchased by the semester, month, week, or day. The daily fee is \$2 for all categories except motorcycle parking, which is \$1.

Visitor permits are \$2 per day and \$5 per week.

Free parking is available in the Green Lot of the Thomas & Mack Center. Permits are not required in metered spots, but vehicles with permits that are parked in metered spots must use the meter.

No additional permit is required for vehicles parked in designated handicap sots and bearing handicap permits issued by the Nevada Deportment of Motor Vehicles or the cities of

Las Vegas, Henderson, or North Las Vegas.

According to John Amend, associate vice president for administration, the funds raised by the fees will be used to build a much-needed campus parking garage. "Sometime between October and January we will know how much revenue the fee will generate, and that will give us an idea of when we can build a parking garage," he said.

Following is a list of annual fees for various parking categories:

Faculty/staff-\$60; faculty/ staff (student lots)-\$30; student-\$30; residence hall student-\$30; reserved-\$200: vendor-\$100: community-\$30; motorcycle-\$20; visitor-daily or weekly only.

Permits will be available starting August 14 at the UNLV Department of Public Safety, Artemus Ham Concert Hall Box Office, and MoyerStudent Union.
