The SBA offers a variety of financing options for small businesses. But it rarely makes direct loans to a company. Instead, the SBA is primarily a guarantor - it guarantees loans made by banks and other private lenders to small business clients. The SBA also guarantees loans to state and local government and private development organizations which are chartered to promote economic growth in specific areas. These development organizations then make funds available to small

businesses. To assist small contracts, the Agency also provides bonding assistance.

## CONTRACT ASSISTANCE

Each year the federal government contracts with many private firms for billions of dollars in goods and services. The SBA helps small businesses, including minority-owned companies, to acquire a responsive share of federal contracts.

#### **ADVOCACY**

The SBA's Office of Advocacy was established to represent small business

interests before Congress and other federal agencies. It's key mission is to make certain small business will contribute to be the cornerstone of our economy.

It is in the best interest of any prospective or current business owner to know what business information is available, where to get it and most importantly, how to use it. The SBA provides small business owners with six sources of information including:

- 1). Small business Answer Desk: 1-800-827-5722
  - 2). SBA Publications
  - 3). SBA District and Regional

Offices

- 4). Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE)
- 5). Small Business Development Centers (SBDC's)
- Small Business Institutes (SBIs)

The SBA has also developed a "Small Business Start Up Kit," which can be helpful to new or prospective business owners. Included in this kit is information pertaining to SCORE, Calendar Events, an overview of the SBA, a list of all SBA field offices, descriptions of organizations sponsored by the SBA, and

more. This list is available free of charge from your local SBA office. Consult the phone book under U.S. Government or call the Small Business Answer Desk for the local SBA office nearest you.

The SBA's mission is to provide small business owners with guidance. There is no fee for their service. If the SBA can't provide you with the information or assistance you need, they will attempt to put you in contact with someone who can. So contact your local SBA office and see if they can help you. Nike, Apple Computer, and Federal Express are three companies that did. And look what happened to them.

Lieutenant Bird and Captain Wilcox are two of three whites in the African-America based play. Scott Twillegear plays the firebrand Lieutenant who despises blacks and doubts their place in the army. He makes the audience hate him. Twilligear elevates despite the difficult task of being a minority actor in an all black play; how's that for reverse descrimination? Captain Wilcox, played by Luis Frias, while not provided with much stage-time in the production, gives a representative stage presence during his allotment.

The stage belonged to Randy Potter in his portrayal of Corporal Benard Cobb. Cobb, whose character was a close associate to Sergeant Waters, gave the character's love-hate relationship with the Sergeant merit. It would be difficult to pass the bouquet to Cobb without complementing Davenport's portrayal of Waters, which was a complement to Cobb's performance. The chemistry between both made the play substanative. Cobb's ability to show a lack of backbone when confronted and within seconds stretch and grab for the hate and disdain he felt for Davenport's character showed remarkable

was a two-time state championnever losing a match. Washington's trek would take him to the University of Nevada-Las Vegas where he studied theatre and film. In essence, support black theatre.


