The Nevada Museum of Art has developed into a fine facility with a broad range of exhibits each year.

Reno is home to the University of Nevada (UNR) which has over 11,000 full-time students that study everything from mining to medicine. The campus is also home to the National Judicial College, and the National College of Juvenile

Justice. These facilities bring judges from around the world to continue their educations.

"The Biggest Little City in the World," Reno has become the events capitol of the United States. Almost regardless of the time of year, there is a special event going on.

Some of the more well known include: The National Championship Air Races, which have operated each year since 1964. The Reno Rodeo, billed as the World's Richest, began in its present form in the 1950s. The Great Reno Balloon Race that attracts in excess of a hundred magnificent hot air balloons and thousands of participants have become a September tradition.

Hot August Nights is a relatively new event, but has quickly become one of the most popular. Draws better than 100,000 visitors each year.

The National Bowling Stadium. slated for formal opening this year, will host National Men's and Women's events through 2010, as well as many other tournaments.

In addition, there are celebrations, festivals, fairs, races, parades, pow wows, concerts, cultural events, sporting events and reunions throughout the year.

In Reno you will find more ways to have a good time than any other place under the sun!

The downtown core is undergoing a renovation making the Truckee River more of a focal point for residents and visitors.

Day or night, indoors or out, summer or winter, the action's in Reno. The sunshine weather and scenery makes Reno the country's all-season playground.

River Walk has become Reno's landmark. Designed as a public plaza and dedicated in July of 1991, programs are scheduled throughout the summer and fall and include rock and jazz concerts to dances, craft fairs and workshops.

During the cold winter months when the mountains receive an abundance of snow there is some of the greatest skiing in the world. Even the more simple pleasures of sledding and snowpanning provide people of all ages a wonderful time in the snow.

Fishing has developed a marvelous reputation in Reno and there is not more fun than fly fishing in the majestic surroundings. Drink in the crisp

mountain air and feel the excitement when you connect with a wild beautiful trout. Pyramid Lake, just 30 miles north of Reno, will provide all you want in sport fishing.

Although local campgrounds provide varying accommodations, many visitors camp with tents in the wilderness, the high desert and the Sierra Nevada range provide a limitless number of opportunities for hiking, four-wheeling, or cycling, depending on your inclination.

There are a number of outstanding golf courses around the Reno area. Virtually all are open to the public, but advance reservations are a good idea.

Tennis is readily available at public or privately owned courts. The Reno area basks in sunshine more than 300 days a year, and enjoys a relatively low humidity common for the high desert.

The Nevada Jazz Artists concert series will kick off its third season at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 15 at the Winchester Community Center. Appearing will be Raoul Romer's Latin-Jazz Group, an eight piece ensemble featuring three horns and an expanded rhythm section including two keyboardists and two percussionists.

saxophonist/

composer/arranger Romero has been a mainstay on the local jazz scene for many years. Originally from El Paso, Texas, he moved to Las Vegas in 1955 to join the Flamingo Hotel Orchestra, and has since worked for many of the major Strip hotel bands. He toured with the Woody Herman Band in 1964 and '65, a period he considers a high point of his career.

Trumpeter Rocky Lombardo and saxophonist Phil Wigfall round out the front line of Romero's group. The standard rhythm section includes Stefan Karlsson on piano, Morrie Louden on bass, and Santo Savino on drums. Various Latin percussion instruments will be played by Mickey Alvarado and Alfredo Alvarenga.

The program will include new Romero arrangements of jazz standards by John Coltrane, Kenny Dorham and Antonio Carlos Jobim, plus some original works composed by Romero himself. Romero says a highlight will be a piece called "An Apple for Christa," composed by Las Vegas trumpeter Herbie Phillips, who passed away suddenly last month.
