

national R&B charts more than forty times, a feat surpassed by only three other giants of the business: James Brown, Fats Domino and Ray Charles.

Johnny "Guitar Watson has been considered one of the music scene's most colorful "characters" since he began recording more than three decades ago. With Bow Wow, Watson's first album in fourteen years and the debut on his Wilma-Bellmark/Life Records label, the multi-talented super musician-songwriter and producer, sounds better than ever, and he's still more than capable of offering his unique blend of R&B, rock, funk, blues and jazz with that sly dash of lyrical humor that has long been his trademark.. It's all there, and as critics are saying ... it's all good!

When one thinks of survivors of the blues market, Little Milton's name comes up. He is truly of the blues masters. Milton got his start working with Clarksdale band leader lke Turner. Working with Turner led to his first recording on Sun Records in 1953. He attracted Chess Records, where several hit songs were produced, and has managed to weather the storm, and continues to play for keeps. His new album on the Malaco label is justly titled Playing for Keeps.

Clarence Carter has been awarded five gold records and one platinum album throughout his career. He has played in England, France, Italy, South Africa, the Virgin Islands and Japan.
