Proof of Citizenship: Valid U.S. passport or state issued birth certificate.

Water: All drinking water is purified and filtered by the most modern methods.

Shopping: Known for its craft markets, wood, straw, beads, embroidery, gold, silver, china, and electronic equipment, rum, liqueur, perfumes, Blue Mountain coffee and duty free shopping.

Climate: 80 to 86 degrees at sea level year round. Nights and mountains are cool.

Currency Exchange: The rate of exchange at present is \$1.00 (U.S.) equals \$8.00 (Jamaican). Under Jamaican law it is illegal to take Jamaican currency into or out of the island, or to make any payment except in Jamaican dollars.
