African-American contemporary dance company to perform



The acclaimed Lula Washington Contemporary Dance Theatre of Los Angeles, one of the country's premiere African-American dance ensembles, will perform at the West Las Vegas Library, 951 W.

Lake Mead, on Saturday, January 20 at 8:00 p.m. Tickets are \$5.00 for children and seniors and \$7.00 for adults, and are on sale next door to the library at the West Las Vegas Arts Center, 947 W. Lake Mead, or at Reed Whipple Center, 821 N. Las Vegas Blvd.

The performance, which is co-sponsored by the City of Las Vegas Cultural and Community Affairs Division, Clark County Parks and Recreation and the Las Vegas-Clark County Library District, will cap a week of dance workshops for children at the West Las Vegas Arts Center, and two performances on Friday morning at Ruby Thomas Elementary School.

Lula Washington founded her dance theater in 1980 to provide a creative outlet for modern dance artists in south central Los Angeles. She worked with inner city youths who wanted to dance, honing their skills in all forms of movement. The result is a group of adult performers who are energetic and multifaceted, and equally at home with authentic African dance as they are with abstract modern dance or traditional dance theater.

The performance in Las Vegas will include a piece choreographed by Reno dancer L. Martina Young, called "Pearls of Obsidian," which incorporates sign language into the dance movements. Segments of the piece are set to the poetry of Langston Hughes, Countee Cullen, James Weldon Johnson and Gwendolyn Brooks.

Critics have raved about the dance company for years. The Village Voice said of their 1989 New York performance: ...dancing, first and foremost. Oh joy!" The New York Times called their performance, " ... fervent... rich in implication... impassioned." The dance company has toured internationally and has been a perennial favorite at performances for the International Association of Black Dance Companies.


