"Release date set for Fred Williamson's latest flick '

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Brown ("Slaughter"), Pam Grier ("Foxy Brown"), Richard Roundtree ("Shaft"), Ron O'Neal (Superfly), Paul Winfield ("Gordon's War") and Isabel Sanford from the popular television series Jeffersons," plus others.

The drug-dealing gangbangers in this action packed film are portrayed by today's genre of popular rappers in the persons of Ice Tea, Drew Down, The Luniz's, Bushwick Bill and Shaeim. This talent pairing brings the old school of box office attractions together with the new school of today's recording stars.

Even though the picture may have somewhat of a new twist from the story line and techniques of pictures produced during the 'black renaissance' era of films, "the market has always been there for the black hero," states Williamson. "Look at the gate receipts produced by various black pictures playing in theatres today!"

The original deal was structured whereby Orion holds the North American rights for Fred's new film, and foreign rights have been sold through Big Bear Releasing.
