REME COURT UPHOLDS DECIS **CUT NUMBER OF BLACK DIST**

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court has allowed an appeals court decision to stand a new redistricting map which slashes the number of predominantly-black congressional districts in Georgia to one from three.

For the last three years, Georgia officials have grappled with how to re-draw the legislative districts in the state, which boasts a 27 percent black population, amid intense scrutiny by the U.S. Justice Department. The American Civil Liberties Union has filed an appeal on behalf of black and white voters in the district who supported the map with three black districts, but it is not clear whether the high court will hear it.

would take us back to the days before the Voting Rights Act of 1965, when legislative bodies were composed of whites and blacks were second class voters if that," said Laughlin McDonald, the lawyer who filed the appeal. Since the Voting Rights Act, the Justice Department has approved every new election law in the United States. Justice Department officials had sent two Georgia 1992 proposals back to the legislature saying that the state needed at least three predominantly black congressional districts.

Last year, the Supreme Court ruled that race cannot be the predominant factor in the determination of districts in a landmark case, Should they decide not to hear the appeal, "it which struck down the 11th Congressional District.
