## THE EDUCATION MINUTE Parents can make a difference in helping children succeed at reading

Sadly, many thousands of Americans are illiterate. Here are some things parents can do to help ensure their children succeed at reading.

Read to preschool children at least 20 minutes a day - or have older children read to you. Make reading a natural part of their daily routine.

Keep books, good magazines and newspapers in the house. Make it easy to find something to read.

Add to your children's enjoyment of reading by discussing each book they read. It also helps them learn to express themselves.

Make sure your children see you read for at least 20 minutes a day. Remember, you're their primary role model.

If you have difficulty reading, tell your children stories. Hearing about your family history and your own experiences will help them develop an appreciation for storytelling.

Limit your children's TV viewing to no more than two hours a day. Studies show that while a little television each day
