Former Surgeon General Dr. Joycelyn Elders, renowned author and publisher Haki Madhubuti and former world heavyweight boxing champion Muhammad Ali are just three of the guests speaking at local colleges this week.

Elders, the only African-American female to serve as the nation's leading doctor, will speakat the Community College of Southern Nevada, Cheyenne Campus, 3200 E. Cheyenne Ave., Feb. 23 in the Nicholas Horn Theatre. Tickets, which cost \$10 for students with campus identification and seniors over 62 and \$15 for the general public, are available in the bursars office at each CCSN campus.

The quotable Elders began college at the tender age of 15 where she saw her first doctor. She graduated as a first lieutenant in the U.S. Army at 18 and began physical therapist's training. Elders, now a pediatric endocrinologist, is speaking as part of the school's Distinguished Lecturer Series.

Madhubuti, who spoke at the Million Man March, will be at the CCSN this Saturday and Sunday.

On Saturday, Madhubuti, will participate in the Wine, Spirits and Jazz Fundraiser. The public is invited to meet the best-selling author with more than 3 million books in print, from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. in the Cheyenne Campus Student Lounge.

Artists and educators to come together for "Collaborations'96"

CARSON CITY — If you're a teacher wanting to promote the arts in your classroom, or an artist just trying to earn a descent living, the Nevada State Council on the Arts (NSCA) invites you to join them for a brainstorming session March 3-4 in Reno. The two-day conference, "Collaborations '96" will be held at the Midby-Byron Center at the University of Nevada, Reno.

"We're inviting anyone who is interested in any artistic form, including those who create, those who teach, and those who administer," said Susan Boskoff, NSCA's executive director. "We're hoping participants will share ideas and information, form new partnerships, develop new programs, and brainstorm about how to offer quality arts education to Nevada's students and adults."

The Sunday, March 3 Arts In Education program will be geared toward teachers, and will explore the role of the arts in school programs across Nevada. NSCA welcomes those who teach any art form, such as dance, poetry, painting, music, writing, theater, or sculpture, etc. Those attending the Sunday program will hear from storyteller and composer Pat Mendoza from Denver and from arts administrator Carole Wolfe from Poughkeepsie, NY. In addition, artists from NSCA's Artist In Residence Program roster will present "hands-on" workshops in various arts disciplines, and arts educators from selected schools will describe their innovative arts programs.

The Monday, March 4 Arts In Education program will bring together staff from the arts organizations involved with the newly-formed "Arts In Education Consortium" of greater Reno and teachers from the Hug High School "cone" of schools. Four artists from NSCA's Artist In Residence Program roster will present an original opening performance-participation event. Vicki Poppen, who heads Portland, Oregon's Regional Arts & Culture Council's education program will facilitate an arts program planning meeting.

In addition, Monday's program will also include workshops for artists on managing the business side of their art careers.

This one-day program will include an artists interdisciplinary panel titled "How to Survive and Prosper Through Freelancing" moderated by artist Jon Winet. Later in the day professional consultants will offer three discipline-based sessions in the literary arts, performing arts, and visual arts.

Trudy McMurrin, University of Nevada Press' Acquisitions Editor, will discuss the world of publishing, how to find a publisher or an agent, and writeragent and writer-publisher relations. Professor Tom Goetzl of Golden Gate University in San Francisco will present

information on protecting visual artists' rights, copyright matters, and artist-gallery relations/rights and obligations. Lee Betton of Betton Concert Artists in Denver and Susan Endrizzi of California Artists Management in San Francisco will distribute the nuts and bolts of touring, artist selfmanaging, and artistmanagement relations for artists in the performing arts.

The NSCA was founded in 1967 as a state agency charged with developing and promoting the arts in Nevada. The Council's statewide programs include Artists' Services, Arts In Education, Community Arts Development, Folk Arts, and Grants. Council funds designated to support the work of Nevada artists and arts organizations come from the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency, and through appropriations from the Nevada State Legislature.

A one-day registration fee for "Collaborations '96" is \$25, with the two-day registration fee set at \$35. Prices include breakfast, lunch, and program materials. The registration deadline is February 28.
