Judge awards suit to county black fire fighters

Johnson Lowe has ordered, as a result of a suit by the Professional Black Fire Fighters of Clark County an award of \$660,000 from the Clark County Fire Department, stemming from a 1986 allegement of a pattern of racial discrimination and harrassment.

The order, dated September 20, concluded that, "The court hereby awards plaintiff (The Professional Black Fighters of Clark County) \$660,000 in compensatory damages."

The award is one of the highest ever issued in the history of the state. The order came after, Lowe determined in a 62page ruling dated April 1994, that for years, the civil rights of black fire fighters were violated by the department. In her ruling, Lowe said "black fire fighters were exposed to an unreasonably abusive or offensive workrelated environment."

The order came nearly 12 years and over \$500,000 in legal fees for a positive reply from the courts.

The court will rule later on the issue of "remaining relief," to include entitlement to attorneys and expert witness fees."

Originally, the suit named the Local 1908 of the International Association of Fire Fighters as one of the defendants. Current president of Local 1908, Mark Balen, said that "the total membership of the union is 530
