
Police vs. firemen in basketball benefit

The North Las Vegas Police Department has vowed to win the second annual North Las Vegas Challenge, a benefit basketball game between NLVPD and the North Las Vegas Firefighters.

The game will take place at 1 p.m., Saturday, March 22, in the Cheyenne High School Gym at 3200 W. Alexander Road in North Las Vegas.

Proceeds will benefit the North Las Vegas Neighborhood Housing Services, a local nonprofit housing corporation striving to rehabilitate mature neighborhoods near the downtown area of North Las Vegas and to provide decent housing for low-income residents.

Donated tickets to the event are provided to middle school children enrolled in the North Las Vegas Police Department's Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE)



program. Merchants may also donate items such as sporting equipment and t-shirts which will be given as door prizes to DARE students attending the game.
