The Federal Reserve has declined to require reporting of statistics on business and consumer lending to African Americans and Latinos. The local Federal Reserve has just analyzed the required data on home mortgages for the San Francisco Bay area and found that racial steering and differential patterns of service are still widespread. This could be an area where the aggressive fundraising by the Clinton administration is actually making a difference as top banking regulators met with major banks in White House coffees. Brownridge correctly perceives that the King legacy has lost much of its original

helping to move the nation from gaining full civil rights for all to ensuring economic rights for those historically disenfranchised," he wrote.

For the 30th anniversary of his death, the only true tribute will be to transform the streets named for the Dreamer. San Francisco is one of the cities without a King Street, having spent over a decade to decide on the King memorial fountain in Yerba Buena Gardens. However, Brownridge's point still resonates for the growing support to name Third Street which passes the King memorial in honor of Dr. Carlton Goodlett, the physician, psychologist, publisher and gubernatorial candidate, who simultaneously advocated greater participation of African-Americans in the economy.

It takes more than just a name to transform a street, it has to also take investment dollars.

Besides being community leaders black women are now moving from being the emotional backbone of our communities to our most potent economic force. In the process of making businesses grow, African-American women are in the front of blacks' economic development. They create jobs, provide needed products and services and are serving as role models of business success.

Black women entrepreneurs are everywhere. More than 45,000 black women have taken advantage of business ownership through Mary Kay Products and its line of ethnically-oriented cosmetics. As Beauty Consultants or Sales Directors, these women are building businesses on a parttime or full-time basis. They have formed the Black Advisory Women's Committee (BWAC) and serve as a liaison between black sales force members and the company. They participate in community organizations and other activities that reinforce the commitment of Mary Kay to the African-American community. According to industry research, the ethnic cosmetics segment is expected to have 1997 sales of \$162 million. Mary Willis, a member of the BWAC and Senior Sales Director from Cincinnati, says, "Success with Mary Kay is a sombination of personal determination, the company's quality products and the overall growth of the beauty industry among ethnic consumers." Willis left a full-time job to pursue an independent business career.

The nation has 21 million registered business firms and women own over one-third of them. Women entrepreneurs have outpaced the overall growth of businesses by nearly two to one, increasing by 78 percent between 1987 and 1996. Those African-American women ready to take the plunge can start with a home-based business. Note that the cosmetics industry is growing, but trends also show that the most explosive growth areas for women-owned businesses are in construction, wholesale trade, transportation, communications and agriculture.

In North America, however, women's life expectancy improved by four years over the past decades, while male life expectancy improved by five years, thereby decreasing the male-female gap from 7.7 years to 6.7 years.

The male-female gap also decreased slightly in Africa, from 3.1 to 2.9 years.

major publishers encourage black writers to write shallow, pretentious works in order to make fast sales? Do black readers fawn over these authors because they demand less, and accept less, from black writers? Do reviewers make a slavish bow to political and racial correctness by hailing the works of these intellectual impostors as deeply profound probes of racial problems?

It's all of the above. Many black intellectuals have figured out that the key to publishing success isn't in spending years busting their butts on research and interviews, hassling with students, going through gyrations to get research grants, and having their works subjected to unsparing criticism from other academics. Instead they can grab instant success pontificating on racism on TV talk shows, collecting steep honorariums for spewing their pop social theories at colleges and hobnobbing with the social elites on the banquet circuit.

I'd like to think that a new crop of black scholars will mine the rich load of historical material on the black experience and produce works of scholarship worthy of the name. But I'm not optimistic. Weaned on sound-bites, photo-ops, and tabloid journalism, nurtured on MTV videos, spoon fed information via the Internet, many young people have made instant gratification a fetish, and reading books and newspapers a dead art. The dumbing down of black America almost certainly will worsen. And the up and coming black intellectuals will likely take the cue and realize that the quick and dirty way to recognition is to churn out an instant "hit."

Meanwhile scholars such as Lewis, Rampersad, Kelly and Painter will continue to be lonely souls turning out first-rate works that deepen our awareness of the contemporary historical black experience. And this is a pity. Black scholars can do much better and black readers deserve much better.
