For universities in Texas with a predominantly minority student population, merging with larger educational systems has revitalized some struggling institutions. But members of Texas Southern University's Board of Regents have mixed attitudes about merging.

Some members are seriously considering the possibility of a merger while others say it's a road they would rather not travel.

With more than a decade of repeated problems in TSU's financial affairs department, the university is faced with only one option: Correct the problems or prepare for a merger.

While the board has no real say in whether or not it will merge — that decision will come from the 76th Texas

Legislature, which convenes in 1999 - members vary on their views about it and how the university should handle the dilemma.

Like many of the regents, board chair Enos Cabell, Jr. said transferring to another system is not an option, and that Texas Southern should concentrate on getting to the root of the problem - putting its financial matters in order.

"TSU is under tremendous financial pressure from the past. This is hanging over our heads," Cabell said of the school's history of poor fiscal management.

"As chair, I would never recommend the school go into a system," he said. "The main game plan is to make sure our fiscal stability at the school is right. The main thing I want is for TSU to be financially able to cover the bills.

For those opposed to the merger, a major concern for the university is the loss of autonomy.

Former regent Rufus Cormier, whose term recently expired, said the vision of TSU's founders may become blurred if the school is no longer independent.

"I don't think merging would be good for TSU. It was put here for a certain reason. It was put here to help minorities get the education they needed when they couldn't get into white predominantly colleges," he said.

Regent Willard Jackson, Jr. agrees that TSU's autonomy is one of the most important issues for the historically Black university.

Cormier said the only real option they have is to trust the president James Douglas.
