NEW YORK — Pioneer composer Duke Ellington and soprano Leontyne Price top the first class of inductees into the American Classical Music Hall of Fame.

The list, announced Monday at the Juilliard School in New York, also includes Isaac Stern, George Gershwin and John Philip Sousa.

Among the other 25 inductees plus the Marine Band are composer Elliott Carter, composerconductor Gunther Schuller and conductor


Others to be inducted are Scott Joplin, Samuel Barber, Leonard Bernstein, Aaron Copland, Hall on May 24.

Howard Hanson, composer-conductor Charles Ives, John Knowles Paine, Arnold Schoenberg, Roger Sessions and Igor Stravinsky.

Conductors to be honored are Serge Koussevitzky, Fritz Reiner, Leopold Stokowski, Arturo Toscanini and Theodore Thomas. Contralto Marian Anderson and musicologist Nicolas Slonimsky also are being inducted.

The hall "wants to celebrate people who have contributed to American music and music in America," said Samuel Adler, co-chairman of the Hall of Fame's artistic directorate.

# Citizens ask for officer to resig

A day before the Police Protective Association will pass judgement on the fate of a member blasted for making a racial slur, a coalition of citizens gathered in front of City Hall to ask for the officer's resignation.

"We are astounded, disappointed, and very disturbed about the event that transpired recently by officer Dan Holley," Assemblyman Wendell Williams told the crowd. "We are more disturbed by how the administration has handled this situation."

The Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department verbally reprimanded Holley and demanded the vice president of the association, which represents Metro's rank and file officers, attend sensitivity training for referring to Martin Luther King Day as "Martin Luther Coon Day" during a Jan. 15." speech about holidays off to 36 corrections academy cadets at the Clark County Detention

Center. Four black cadets heard the remark. Twenty-one cadets complained to their supervisors.

Holley, elected vice president of the association three years ago, apologized for the gaffe, calling it "a slip of the tongue." He has refused to resign despite a recall petition circulating among members of the association. The PPA board is expected to make a decision today. Williams said the Atlanta-based Martin Luther King Jr. Center of Non-Violence and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference have pledged to step in and resolve the situation should it

Holley's remark was met with harsh

### arrakhan visit unwelcome, rankles some Russians

MOSCOW - Denouncing the presence of "foreign preachers," authorities of a volatile southern Russia province said Louis Farrakhan's trip to Dagestan was unwelcome.

Authorities in the southern province, which borders the rebel republic of Chechnya, said the Nation of Islam leader arrived without proper papers and made anti-Russian remarks.

They warned him that his visit Sunday was not welcome, said Magomed Tolboyev, security chief of Dagestan, which, like Chechnya, is predominantly Muslim.

"Americans may know (Farrakhan), but we don't and have no such desire," the Associated

Press quoted Tolboyev as saying in a telephone interview from Makhachkala, Dagestan's capital. "We don't need any foreign preachers here."

Farrakhan, who is on a world tour with 27 Muslim leaders from various countries, spent one day in Dagestan and left for Iran late Sunday, when his Russian visa was about to expire.

He said he wanted to meet Chechen leaders, but was unable to, Tolboyev said, because police stopped Farrakhan from traveling to Dagestan's border with Chechnya for a meeting with Movladi Udugov, Chechnya's first deputy premier.

Tolboyev said Farrakhan made unspecified "anti-Russian" statements while in Dagestan. Authorities in Dagestan fear the turmoil in Chechnya could destabilize their region.

The Russian government, which failed to suppress the Chechens' independence bid during a 1994-1996 war, insists that Chechnya remains part of Russia and warns foreign nations against contacts with the breakaway region.

Officials at the Russian Foreign Ministry in Moscow declined comment on Farrakhan's visit.

Farrakhan's tour began in December with a trip to Iraq, angering U.S. officials who had advised him not to go.

He also has visited Libya and plans to visit North Korea and Cuba — all countries that Americans are warned not to enter.
