Darden to play detective in TV movie

NEW YORK — Former O.J. prosecutor Christopher Darden, who has already authored a book about the "trial of the century," is hitting the small screen this weekend in a made-for-television movie eerily similar to the Simpson case.

The former Los Angeles prosecutor who failed to convict the former NFL star with murdering his ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend Ronald Goldman will play a detective in

"One Hot Summer Night," which airs on ABC on March 12. Darden is investigating the death of a sports figure's blonde wife. Sound familiar?

"I'm sort of playing me," Darden said in the March 7 TV Guide. "As a prosecutor, one is very much a cop."

Darden, who retired as a prosecutor after Simpson was acquitted, had a small role as a preacher in "Touched by an Angel."
