"I was raised to believe that if you don't give when you don't have, you won't give when you do have," he said.

One way he gives: Working with Habitat for Humanity, a group which builds homes for low-income families.

He is also donating the proceeds of his most recent single "Still I Try" of which he produced 5,000 copies, to the Las Vegas chapter of Habitat for Humanity. He's also in "The Race for the Cure," and wrote a song for the foster children's camp, "Camp to Belong." Prince plans to put "sweat equity" into the local Habitat for Humanity house and hopes to raise the \$60,000 for the project.


