"Children love discipline," she said. "You don't yell at them or hit them, but you have to be firm with them. They respect that. They pay attention."

"Grandma, can I sit by Jerrica, 'cause we're getting along and stuff?" asks a child in her care.

"Alright, you sit next to her," she replied, directing the children to quietly move the chairs and change their seating arrangement. Alexander stresses cooperation.

Later, a voice rises, tinged with sadness to make a point, 'Grandma, she punched me."

"Who punched you?" Alexander asks. The child points. "Tatiana, Tatiana, come here," Alexander commands. "Tell Jerrica you're sorry you punched her, and give her a hug. Come on, we're peace makers, you know. Give her a hug."


The two girls hug; the conflict is over. "She needs extra attention," Alexander said of Tatiana. "If she were over there with the larger class, she wouldn't get any benefits."
