Ronald Clark, 11, an honor student at Keiller Middle School, is in his second year at Freedom School. He was reluctant to attend last year's session, but was soon won over.

"The first day showed me that it would be a fun summer," Ronald said. "Harambee time gets you hyped up and makes you want to learn and do different things. We get to dance and sing songs."

Ronald already has his sights on a career that includes ownership of a computer graphics company that makes screen savers and video games. He has narrowed his choice of college to Baylor, Alabama, the University of Maryland and the University of North Carolina after visiting each campus via the Internet.

Ronald said he enjoys playing a black version of the trivia game show "Jeopardy" while at Freedom School. He said public schools need to do a better job of weaving the history of African-Americans into their everyday history lessons not just reserving it for February's Black History Month.

And he finds value in Freedom School.

"It shows that African-American adults are trying to get more children involved so they can have a better life," Ronald said.
