Indeed, Enemy of the State is a fast-paced, visual thriller that proves true the worst fears of any paranoid conspiracy theorist. That is, Big Brother is watching you and he can destroy your life.

Will Smith (Men in Black) stars as Robert Dean, a hotshot D.C. labor lawyer, who has it all. He's confident, intelligent and wealthy.

He has a loving family. The last thing on his mind is a Congressional bill which would allow a powerful government agency, the National Security Agency (NSA), to utilize high technology to surveil anyone the agency chooses without permission. Dean's wife Carla, portrayed by Regina King (How Stella Got Her Groove Back), rails against the invasion of privacy the bill represents.

The tape shows the deadly lengths that Reynolds (Jon Voight), a State Department official who is on loan to the NSA, will go to ensure that the bill is passed.

#### Winfrey, partners to form cable network for women

Three of the most successful women in television are banding together to form Oxygen, a cable network aimed at women.

Former Nickelodeon president Geraldine Laybourne's company, Oxygen Media, announced last week it will team with Oprah Winfrey and producer Marcy Carsey to create the new channel, which will provide entertainment, news and sports programming.

Oxygen would compete with Lifetime, the only established cable channel that caters directly to women. Lifetime, already seen in 72 million homes, has provided mainly movies and reruns but recently added women's basketball and original programs to broaden its appeal.

Oxygen is expected to make its debut on Jan. 1, 2000. It has already signed a deal with cable giant Tele-

the Nickelodeon children's network into one of the most successful channels on cable and later served as president of Walt Disney Co.'s cable channels. She left Disney in May to form Oxygen Media, a cable TV and online company geared toward women and children.

Under the deal, Winfrey's production company, Harpo Entertainment Group, and Carsey-Werner-Mandabach Co. will take stakes in Oxygen Media - joining other bigname investors, America Online Inc. and Disney's

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### Hollywood shutting black movies out of lucrative foreign market

American culture exerts a powerful influence across the globe. Movies are a driving force behind the influence.

But rarely are African-American-focused films played in foreign markets, although blacks support the motion picture industry in droves, buying 25 percent of movie industry products.

For filmmakers, foreign box offices is where it's at. That audience is growing at a rate of about 6 to 7 percent annually - three times as fast as the domestic market - and black movies don't seem to figure into the money equation. U.S. movie distributors took in \$5.85 billion from foreign box offices last year.

Actually, it makes good business sense for Hollywood executives to go where they feel the money is. Ten years ago, 70 percent of the industry's revenue came from American movie-houses. The foreign market didn't have multiplex theaters then.

The bottom-line now shows the overseas market helped the epic disaster film
