The Washington, D.C. based Children's Defense transportation was distributed Fund looked at the unequally. undercounts measured in the largest cities around the nation and found that if the rate of undercounts in the 2000 census are similar to those in 1990, the census will missmore than 6,400 children in Miami, more than 52,000 in Los Angeles, more than 18,000 in Philadelphia, and almost 4,700 children in Cincinnati. In fact, the number of children missed would fill 77 schools staffed by 2,177 teachers in Los Angeles, and 33 schools staffed by 1,067 teachers in Philadelphia.

The failure to accurately count a state's population seriously affects the federal funding these states receive.

According to Dr. Michael Casserly of the Council of Great City Schools, every child not counted by the census means that some \$650 in federal resources is lost each year by the school that must educate that child. For a classroom of 25 uncounted students, this equals \$16,250 each year.

Over the past decade, states with larger than average undercounts were required to use their own funds to provide services for residents for which they did not receive funding. As a result of the inaccuracy of the 1990

"Even though we have all these black folks in office, the white folks still have the money and they're still in control," civil rights veteran Hosea Williams said.

And many newcomers who venture here purely on speculation have discovered that opportunity does not necessarily guarantee success.

"In years past, people were coming here expecting the golden turkey to lay the golden egg in their lap," said Daniel Johnson, president of the Black Newcomer's Network, which has grown to about 100 members. "What people are realizing now is that you have to have something to bring to the table."


supplies the nutrients the brain needs to survive." This reduced blood flow can cause additional damage to the already injured brain. As part of the five-year study, researchers will use a new technique to identify patients at greatest risk of additional brain injury. The technique, transcranial Doppler, uses an ultrasound of the brain's major blood vessels to reveal decreased blood flow.

"Patients with impaired flow will be given standard treatments to increase their blood pressure," said Dr. Alex Valadka, a Baylor neurosurgeon involved in the study. "Although increasing the blood pressure can reduce additional brain injury, it causes an increased risk of lung

benefit most from increased blood-pressure treatments." A second part of the study involves the use of an amino acid, L-arginine, to improve blood flow.

"L-arginine is normally present in the body and metabolizes into nitric oxide, which dilates blood vessels and regulates blood flow," Robertson said. "Some of the patients identified with impaired blood flow will also be given this treatment."

Over five years, the group will test the new techniques on 300 patients. Patients will be evaluated at one, three and six months after injury to assess their long-term outcome. "The loss of productive years of life due to head injury is devastating. Through research, we hope to improve recovery and decrease disability due to head injury," Robertson said.
