up with a lot of people in jail for non-violent crimes, about 35%. You mix up these offenders with criminals who' e committed heinous acts and you get overcrowdedness, crime and murders in jail. The state ends up fighting lawsuits and releasing convicts who may be dangerous."

Privatizing medical care in prisons is another issue where the Southern Nevada legislators stand at odds with Guinn.

Neal believes that Guinn's push to privatize the industry is a move to avoid creating an adequate system and filter more dollars into friends' pockets who are part of the prison economy.

Nuclear Waste At Yucca

While Williams found Guinn's pledge to fight nuclear waste dumping at Yucca Mountain "refreshing", Neal described it as "raising the red herring."

"The real threat out here isn't nuclear waste," Neal said, "The real threat is anthrax, napalm and terrorism. People get frightened whenever the nuclear waste issue is brought up and politicians use it to their advantage." Neal said that people are not getting the proper information from their representatives.

Ms. Goldstein acknowledged the ADL had given Lyons no timeline or instructions for distributing the money.

Lyons' defense lawyers told jurors in opening statements Monday that Lyons held the money in bank accounts while researching "I find it amazing that the people closest to it—like the folks in Beaty and Lakeland County—ain't saying nothing! It's Las Vegas, where nuclear waste will probably never even come through, those are the people who are in an uproar," Neal said.

Budget

Williams applauded Guinn's attempt at firm leadership, but criticized his outlines for the budget as overly aggressive.

"Guinn gets up and just lays it out, 'Boom, this is what we're going to do with the money.' The taxpayers should decide where the money is spent."


Neal again stressed the importance of holding the gaming industry accountable.

"Gaming has not paid its fare share in taxes. Their taxes haven't increased in 11 years, even though they've increased their profits by \$100 billion in that time." Neal continued, "Gaming is the dominant industry, but they don't want to pay for the problems they create, like gaming addiction and mental health problems."

Neal criticized Guinn's plan to issue bonds saying that doing so will only put undue strain on property taxes, which he said is where bond money comes from.
