(Continued from page 12) African troops. Besides the C-130 crews, the only other direct American participation will be several officers acting as advisers, said Rear Adm. Koos Louw, director of foreign relations at the South African Defense Ministry.

The legal documents, once formally in place, will provide the basis for all future U.S. military activities in South Africa, Louw said. The Blue Crane exercise will mark the first time American troops have operated in South Africa, although it will be only a token presence.

Only one year ago the U.S. government ended its ban on

arms trade with the South African government after the Justice Department settled legal claims for violations of U.S. export laws.

At a ceremony in the Castle of Good Hope, a pentagonal fortification that is headquarters to the Western Province Command of South Africa's Army, Cohen and Modise signed an agreement to exchange information on military environmental issues such as cleaning up surplus military bases, disarming conventional munitions and managing military live-fire ranges.

"It shows that the progress we are making in our

relationship, indeed, is more than verbal, it is now committed to deeds as well," Cohen said. Later he added, "From my meetings here it is clear that our militaries will have many opportunities to advance our mutual goals to help make Africa a continent of peace and prosperity in the 21st century."

Modise thanked Cohen for U.S. willingness to share expertise in peacekeeping. He said in response to a question, however, that the South African government is not yet ready to participate in a U.S. program of peacekeeper training that is being offered to many African nations.

"The new spirit of cooperation between our two countries, and in particular between our two departments of defense, manifests itself in your visit to South Africa," Modise said. Cohen is the first American secretary of defense ever to visit South Africa.

The talks were meant to help lay the groundwork for a visit here by Vice President Al Gore this week for a meeting of a U.S.-South Africa commission working on a range of issues such as trade and business development, the environment, agriculture and military relations.

to the spirit of violence that runs rampant in the streets of New York," Interior Minister Zainoul Sanoussi told reporters just before the flight touched down.

At Conakry's Ignace Deen hospital morgue, the Rev. Al Sharpton, the New York City black activist who accompanied the family to Guinea, told cabinet ministers, "We promise we will go home and fight for justice."

Diallo, whose father is a prominent Guinean trader, was educated at private schools in Thailand and Singapore, but was in New York working as a street peddler — hawking videotapes, socks and other items from a sidewalk table.

Four police officers searching for a rapist fired 41 bullets at the 22-year-old man as he stood in the vestibule of his New York apartment building, hitting him 19 times. The officers involved have been placed on administrative non-enforcement duties, but still carry their weapons and badges.

An attorney for the officers has said that police thought Diallo was armed.
