# ENTERTAINMENT Famed choreographer Alvin Ailey honored

NEW YORK (AP) — "Hymn," a 33-minute dance Judith Jamison created in tribute to Alvin Ailey, was the centerpiece of the next WNET "Great Performances."

The hourlong show, "A Hymn for Alvin Ailey," aired Wednesday on PBS and included interviews with former dancers, photographer Jack Mitchell and Ailey, the dancer-choreographer who founded the popular Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater.

Ailey died 10 years ago at age 58 but "he still can emotionally move us," says Jamison, in her 10th year as artistic director of the company. "He thought dance should take you someplace emotionally."

Jamison says that with "Hymn" she was attempting to have a conversation with Ailey, to tell him that the company is continuing in the way he envisioned.

When she was thinking about choreographing "Hymn" for the company's 35th anniversary, in 1993, Jamison went to the theater to see Anna Deavere Smith's one-woman show in which she created characters for people she had interviewed in Crown Heights, Brooklyn.

"Her technique sparked me," Jamison says. "I said to her, 'Why don't you interview my dancers about Alvin and let's see what we



# WHOOPI GOLDBERG

Whoopi happy with 'Squares' NEW YORK (AP) — Whoopi Goldberg doesn't want to hear trash talk from people who think her doing "Hollywood Squares" is a major comedown for the Academy Award-winning actress.

"I don't need to have three films coming out and watch my hair fall out worrying about the opening weekend gross," Goldberg says in the Feb. 13-19 TV Guide. "I like this schedule and the money is good." Through her clout, the "Hollywood Squares" center square and executive producer has been able to get such guests as Robin Williams, Billy Crystal, Danny Glover, Melanie Griffith, Rosie O'Donnell, Trisha Yearwood and Garth Brooks.

"Some of them are doing this as a favor to me. Some figure it can't hurt their careers," Goldberg said. "I cherish all the people who have said yes because they don't care what the perception is."

Smith interviewed the dancers and in the PBS show, she appeared near dancers while they dance, speaking the dancer's words in what she perceives to be the dancer's voice or accent.

Not every dancer is eloquent, Jamison says, but they all were real, which Ailey would have liked.

"Some things they talk about are so mundane and some are so important. It's what we really all are. We can't be profound 24 hours a day. I think it was very important for dancers to express how they felt about being with Alvin or being young and not being with him," Jamison says.

She said Ailey believed in individuality, meaning he didn't choose dancers of only one body type, height or color. "He always said, 'Let me help you along to become this person you're going to be." And he brought many

choreographers' work into the company, along with his own dances. The company continues to bring in new dances. The 40th anniversary season in New York in December saw four premieres, one by Jamison, one by French choreographer Redha and two by company members Lisa Johnson and Troy O'Neil Powell.

Jamison joined the Ailey company in 1965 and soon became a star. Of the dances Ailey created forher, the most famous is the solo "Cry," about the trials and strengths of black women. The dance was a birthday present to Ailey's mother.

"Alvin used to say, 'I want the audience to see how difficult this is.' He didn't always want you to look like you had the ease of the movement," Jamison says. "He thrived on how hard we worked to show the emotion of the pieces."

In "Hýmn," Jamison used some of Ailey's choreographic movements as a tribute. In the beginning and end, she says, she used abstract versions of "Wade in the Water" and "I Been 'Buked," two sections from "Revelations" Ailey's masterwork. "Of course, I wanted to invoke those shapes in my way and I did that on purpose," Jamison says.

"Hymn" was filmed in May 1997 in a theater in Purchase, N.Y., as well as the "spiritual walking" section at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City, where Ailey's funeral was. The show also has brief footage of the funeral, which was attended by 5,000 people.

Jamison would like the TV show to be available to college movie theaters, film festivals and video stores. "I want it to be as accessible as Alvin wanted the dance company to be — and it still is," she says.

The 31-member company is on a U.S. tour through May 15. The Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble tours all the time. It gives graduates of Ailey's school two years of experience before they audition for the senior company.

"Alvin's spirit is alive and well. As long as we're doing his work," Jamison says, "his spirit will always be there."
