What can one man do in the midst of madness? The characters in the war film "The Thin Red Line" ponder this question and tackle other issues as well.

The film marks the return of the legendary director Terrence Malick (Badlands, Days of Heaven) after a 20year absence. His work contemplates war, the everlasting battle between good and evil and the significance of life and death.

The film opens with scenes from an Eden-esqe South Pacific island, the new home of two AWOL American soldiers.

The soldiers' escape from World War II is only temporary as a company of American Army soldiers wrest them from their paradise and thrust the men back into action, shuttling them to for Guadalcanal, the site of one of the bloodiest battles of World War II.

The company determined to take a crucial hill occupied by the Japanese. The ensuing battle tests the minds, bodies and souls of the soldiers The Thin Red Line is neither filled with over-the-top macho posturing nor does it glorify war. Rather it meditates on life in a strifefilled world.

various forms. The interaction of the characters and the voice-over narration of the film raise questions about whether one man's sacrifice matters in an indifferent world and if man is by nature good or evil.

The message in the film is that man is mostly good. However, the film does highlight the fact that hate and violence will continue despite selfless souls who sacrifice their lives.

The character structure of The Thin Red Line may be initially disconcerting there is no true main character - though it's fitting for this film. All characters serve as Malick presents war in its allegorical representations of

the nature of man.

Private Witt Caviezel), one AWOL soldier, sees man's goodness. He is a willing martyr and comforter.

First Sgt. Welsh (Sean Penn) is Witt's antithesis. In his eyes, man can do little good and even do even less to change the hate-filled, statusseeking or power-hungry.

But beneath his tough shell. Welsh is compassionate, as evidenced by risking his life to bring medicine to a wounded soldier.

Lt. Col. Tall (Nick Nolte) is obsessive, proud and willing to sacrifice lives in order to be a general.

Image Awards recipients embody best values

On March 4, nationwide viewers saw a memorable and inspiring television program the NAACP's 30th Image Awards. It was the embodiment of the Image Awards' theme: 30 Years of Celebrating - 90 Years of Courage.

A humble sports megastar and winner of the Jackie Robinson Sports Award, Michael Jordan stressed the importance of education and encouraged youngsters to use the positive support systems in their communities. NAACP Entertainer of the Year, Will Smith, paid tribute to his wife, Jada Pinkett and declared, "You don't have to talk dirty" to succeed as an entertainer. And, internationally acclaimed opera superstar Kathleen Battle moved many to tears as her unrivaled voice accompanied a memorial montage of deceased NAACP supporters and friends.

Highly respected NationsBank (now Bank of America) Chairman and CEO, Hugh McColl, Jr., advocated economic empowerment accepting the prestigious Corporate award for his bank's ongoing partnership with the NAACP. Recipient of the coveted Chairman's award, Harry Belatonte reflected on his significant contributions to the civil rights struggle. Our President's Award honoree, hip-hop icon Lauryn Hill, revealed her spiritual side while praising God as her true inspiration. Eric Clapton and George Benson played a blazing musical tribute to blues legend B.B. King. This year's Image Awards program also featured

appearances by such superstars as Mariah Carey, Blair Underwood, Sinbad, Cicely Tyson, Ossie Davis, Steve Harvey, Morgan Freeman, Kevin Eubanks and Jay Leno.

Filling a stage with celebrities, however, was and is not our ultimate goal. With the Image Awards, we honor individuals and organizations that strive for the portrayal of positive images and meaningful opportunities for

African-Americans. It is our fervent hope that the time will come when there will not be a need for the Image Awards, because African-American talent will, without question, have opportunities, positions and acknowledgment from mainstream awards programs in a manner that does not exist today.

The Image Awards were started in 1962 by the Beverly Hills/Hollywood Branch of

the NAACP to pay tribute to talented African-American artists and professionals who continued to be largely overlooked by mainstream Hollywood. Sammy Davis, Jr., was the first honoree. He was recognized for his stature and his efforts to obtain fair employment for African-American entertainers.
