• From 1988 to 1997, 58, or 4.2% of the 1,384 theatrical motion pictures were directed by African-Americans.

• In 1998, the combined minority membership ---African-American, Latino, Asian/Pacific Islander and Native American - in the Writers Guild of America was a meager 6%.

• In 1997, minorities accounted for 7% of the people employed in television and 5% of those writing produced screenplays.

African-Americans tend to be employed in TV and film projects only with predominately African-American casts and cultural content.

• In the 1997-98 television season, 80% of all TV series had no African-Americans or minorities, or just one minority receiving a screen credit.

Those numbers cry out for greater diversity. The timetables for change, not quotas. We oppose quotas, we embrace diversity. We are looking at a long-term process that includes goals for soliciting writers and directors, a game plan for TV programming and film

projects. As talented as our past and present honorees are, sadly, without the Image Awards, far too many individuals and organizations would not be acknowledged. Remember, not one African-American actor, screenwriter or feature film director received an Oscar nomination this year an unmistakable reminder of the many reasons why the NAACP was founded 90 years ago and why the Image Awards were created.

Although we seek a day when there won't be a need for the Image Awards, that day is in the distant future. The Image Awards exist to make sure that today's scant opportunities for African-American talent in the entertainment industry will

SMITH SENDS VIDEO TO SPECIAL FAN

JANESVILLE, Wis. (AP) - Will Smith is sharing secrets with a special fan about his latest movie. The movie star and recent Grammy winner sent a homemade

videotape to Stacey Taylor, a 28-year-old victim of Huntington's disease. On the tape, he talks about his new movie - "Wild, Wild West" with Kevin Kline, due in theaters this spring - and shows pictures of a prototype doll being made of him as James West, his character in the movie. "No one - no one - has seen this," he confided. "This is like a top-secret, confidential, Warner Bros. in-house secret. Even more than the 'Men in Black' stuff." Smith sent the message after Ms. Taylor's nurse sent in a request to the Dream Foundation, a Santa Barbara,



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Calif.-based group that grants wishes for people with terminal illnesses and less than a year to live. "Tell Will Smith I appreciate what he did for me and thank him for giving me his time," Ms. Taylor said in Monday's Janesville Gazette. About 25,000 Americans have Huntington's, a progressively debilitating brain disorder. Victims, who include the late folk singer Woody Guthrie, gradually lose control over their mental and physical functions.

ICE CUBE ENTERS CONTRACT DISPUTE

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Rappers Ice Cube and Mack 10 backed out of deal to feature their likenesses on clothing and threatened their business partners with



violence, a lawyer told jurors. Businessmen Chris Word and Charles Palmer accuse the rappers of breach of contract and are seeking unspecified damages over the Beverly Hills deal they say the musicians abandoned in 1997. "The defendants decided on their own they would breach the contract, break it," the businessmen's lawyer, David Wiggins, told jurors as the trial began Tuesday. The rappers' lawyer, Irwin Evans, said the four men discussed starting a business but never entered into a partnership deal. He told jurors the dealings got off to a bad start

when Word and Palmer forged Ice Cube's name on a lease agreement. An accountant for the rappers found the business had atrocious bookkeeping, Evans said. "My clients sought to take control of this business ... only after they had put in an excess of \$70,000 and not seen a penny," Evans added.

HUDSON TO PLAY JORDAN'S DAD IN FILM

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP) - Ernie Hudson, who stars on the HBO prison drama "Oz," is getting busy.

Hudson will play basketball great Michael Jordan's slain father, James Jordan, in "Michael Jordan: An American Hero," scheduled for broadcast on Fox April 18. He'll also appear as a homeless war veteran in "Everything's Jake," and as a minister in a New England town in "A Stranger in the Kingdom." Other upcoming films include "October 22nd," "Shark Attack," and "Stealth Fighter," in which he plays the president of the United



States. Best known for his parts on "Ghostbusters" and Michael Jordan "Ghostbusters II," Hudson lives in the San Bernardino mountains southeast of Los Angeles.
