(Continued from Page 13) mandate calling for Jubilee every 50 years when debts are forgiven, these religious leaders have joined their voices in support of Jubilee 2000, an international grassroots effort to cancel the debt and work for the alternative investment of these dollars into human development of poor nations.

Now Representatives Jim Leach and John LaFalce have introduced the Debt Relief for Poverty Reduction Act

(H.R.1095) which calls on the U.S. government to cancel most of the debt and to encourage the World Bank and International Monetary Fund to work for similar debt

And there's also a call for people who care about Africa to telephone Congresspersons on May 25, 1999, African Freedom Day, and ask them to 1) cancel Africa's crushing debt and 2) maintain the African Development Foundation, a

fund created by the Congress in 1995 to explore innovative grassroots development in Africa and 3) restore the funding for the Development Fund for Africa which prioritizes support for women, the poor and rural areas in Africa.

(Continued from Page 12) are damaged, so help us ease the pain." No. We may be damaged. We have been brutalized, after all. But we are also human beings, people like other people — with the capacity to build and create and lead and develop. And it is my belief that it is high time for us to build and create and lead and develop a new politic. An independent, empowering politic that take us beyond the status quo, because the status quo is what's killing our kids and no amount of anger and pain that fails to address that will make a difference.

In New York, there are huge protests going on in response to the brutal murder of Amadou Diallo on February 4th by four white police officers and I have joined thousands of other New Yorkers in marching. But in the Diallo situation, the political question is what all of that mobilization translates into? Does it translate into more political influence for particular black leaders? Fine. But more importantly, does that translate into more political power for the black community?

Not, in my opinion, if that movement is all channeled into institutions like the Democratic Party, which powerfully manipulates the politics of identity, the politics of victimhood.

The status quo political game is one in which black leaders protest about how oppressed we are - get all of us to protest about how oppressed we are - and then use that protest to build their positions in a political party that is oppressing us. It doesn't make sense.

As a political independent, I have been working to create new kinds of political actions and institutions for black people and all people, because I believe in my heart that the status quo political arrangement is profoundly limiting to Black America. The equation, in some ways, is this simple. If we had more

political options to choose from, we'd be more sought after.

If we were more sought after, and less taken for granted as a community, we'd be in a far better position to leverage the power structure for what we need and want and to transform that power structure into something completely different, something bottom-up, grassroots, democratic and inclusive.

If we use the creation of new political options to create a new politic for ourselves and for all people - then we will have made a difference for our children.

the mass school shootings - been the work of Whites, but in the Littleton shooting, at least one of the victims was singled out and shot because he was Black.

Hutchinson said not only are Blacks becoming more afraid, but White students are also becoming more fearful of each other. Instruction in tolerance would be helpful. In most schools, few adults deal with the issue of ridicule.

Members of the Trenchcoat Mafia had been put down by some of the athletes. It is very possible that they chose the only way they knew to manage their feelings. Unfortunately, there are thousands of suburban students who feel lost, and forlorn and ignored.

Moreover, it is frightening that the school shootings are growing in numbers and fatalities. And that sadly, after the attention fades, most parents, adults and school officials will return to the illusion that all is well
