Violence heavy, but 'In Too Deep' very satisfying

Omar Epps (The Wood, The Mod Squad and Scream 2) stars as a detective who infiltrates a Cincinnati drug ring so successfully that his colleagues worry that he may be 'in too deep'.

Actor Lawrence collapses during jog

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. (AP) — Actor Martin Lawrence collapsed while jogging and lay in a coma for three days before regaining consciousness, hospital officials said Wednesday.

Lawrence, 34, who starred in TV's "Martin" and the movies Life, Bad Boys and Nothing to Lose, was listed in serious condition last week at Los Robles Regional Medical

The cause of the collapse

His girlfriend opened their front door after he had gone out for a jog and found him keeled over the doorstep, moaning and having trouble breathing, said hospital spokeswoman Carraway. Lawrence arrived at the hospital with a temperature of 107 degrees and had lapsed into acoma, Ms. Carraway said.

He didn't regain consciousness until Tuesday, she added.

"He's suffering from kidney distress right now, but that's very typical in cases like this," Carraway
