Serena Williams wins U.S. Open

NEW YORK (AP) — The kid sister turned out to be the real champ.

Serena Williams finished the job that big sister Venus couldn't, beating Martina Hingis 6-3, 7-6 (7-4) to capture the U.S. Open title Saturday at age 17 in only her second year as a pro.

As graceful and quick as a gymnast, the powerfully built Williams put on a spectacular display of mature tennis with an all-court attack to become the first black woman to win a Grand Slam title since Althea Gibson in 1958.

"It's just too exciting to compute right now," Williams said. "I've been practicing for this moment so long and it's here. Of course I said I could win the Open, but to actually

Williams sisters win doubles final

NEW YORK (AP) — After winning the U.S. Open doubles with her sister, Serena Williams was the life of the party, joking about taxes on nearly \$1 million in winnings and how next year she might look for new challenges at this Grand Slam.

"I'm thinking maybe next year I should try the men's event and see if I can win a round," she said, working the room for a laugh.

"Just hope not to play anyone like Andre (Agassi) or Pete (Sampras) in the first round."

Serena laughed. Her audience did, too. And all the time, the older sister looked on glumly.

Venus Williams was not in the mood for humor, even after winning the Open doubles crown with her sister on the Open's final day Sunday. The pain from her semifinal loss to Martina Hingis was still too (See Sisters, Page 6)

Gangstaz, along with the Nashville Super Choir, his signature group New Life, and many, many more. Secular artists such as the legendary Nancy Wilson, Shirley Murdock, and Regina Bell were also on hand to sing, shout and offer praise. Activist, pioneer succumbs

James Arthur Gay III, who cemented a stellar reputation in Las Vegas as civic-minded citizen, recorded a slew of firsts for black Nevadans and championed recreational activities for West Las Vegas children in the late1940s, died Friday at Odyssey Hospice of complications from a stroke. He was 83.

Gay served as the director of the Jefferson Recreation Center, a cityrun center opened in the late 1940s at Jefferson Avenue and "D" Street. The Fordyce, Ark., native also made a name for himself in civic and (See Gay, Page 7)
