As the song ended and the group exited stage right, Dr. Jones passed the microphone to incomparable, song stylist extraordinaire, Miss Nancy Wilson, The smooth, mellow, silky sounds of her voice held us in the palm of her hand. Our hearts and minds were then further moved by the anointed spirit of Yolanda Adams via the gift of spoken word, Christian Contemporary followed by Vicki Winans, Music, one of which is talk."

Three of the nation's most influential and recognized African-American organizations have pulled their resources together to help young Blacks who cannot afford to go to

The United Negro College Fund, Congress of National Black Churches and National Urban League plan to host the first Gospel Festival College on Black Entertainment Television on from 7 to 11 p.m. Sunday, Sept.

Hosts for the gala are gospel singers Shirley Caesar and Edwin Hawkins, television host Bobby Jones and singer-actor Lou Rawls. Slated for performances are Kirk Franklin and Nu Nation, Take Six, Yolanda Adams, Peabo Bryson, Denice Williams, Regina Belle, Fred Hammond and Radical for Christ.

"Efforts such as this historical collaboration are the keys to ensuring that our youth are prepared financially and spiritually to meet the academic challenges that will prepare them for success in the new millennium," said Hugh B. Price, President and CEO of the National Urban League.

"The ties that bind gospel music, education, and our community are historic and enduring," said Sullivan Robinson, executive director of the Congress of National Black Churches. "All three are rooted in the black church."

The Congress of National Black Churches represents more than 65,000 churches nationwide with a congregation of more than 20 million. Its purpose is to promote charity and fellowship among denominations to strengthen their outreach into the community.

Founded in 1910, the National Urban League is a non-profit community based, 115 affiliate in 34 states operation which has been the premier voice on education for kindergarten through 12th-grade African-Americans.

The United Negro College Fund is a consortium of 39 private historically Black colleges and universities that administer 450 educational programs that help college students with higher education and career opportunities. More than 300,000 men and women have graduated from its academic institutions.
