Clinton and the United Nations and given an honorary doctorate from Harvard University.

McCarty had left home only for a one-mile walk for groceries and to go to church until she ushered in 1997 by dropping the Times Square ball in New York. She said that was the first time she had ever stayed up until midnight.

She promoted her unpretentious philosophies about life in a 1996 book, "Simple Wisdom for Rich Living."

"It's not the ones that make the big money, but the ones who know how to save who get ahead," she wrote.

"Oseola McCarty is one of those women whose face has 'wise' written all over it," said actor Danny Glover in presenting her an Essence Award in 1996. "She is a kind and generous spirit who has taken the biblical adage 'It's better to give than receive' to heart."

McCarty's donation encouraged others to give money to USM for unfortunate students and the Oseola McCarty Endowed Scholarship Fund began. More than \$330,000 had been raised at the time of her death.

Nine students have received the scholarships and three have graduated. Her activities slowed in 1998 and she was diagnosed with colon cancer that April, just a month after her 90th birthday.

Brewer referred to the murder and boasted about "rolling a tire," which prosecutors said was a derogatory term for assaulting a black person.

"Well, I did it," Brewer wrote. "And no longer am I a virgin. It was a rush and I'm still licking my lips for more."

Brewer also wrote King after their arrests, saying they had become "bigger stars" than O.J. Simpson and a life sentence would do them no justice. Brewer wrote that lethal injection would be "a little old sleeping medicine."

King was tried in Jasper, but Brewer's case was moved to Bryan, about 150 miles west, because of intense publicity.

the El Capitan Casino in Hawthorne is a story many like to tell. In the 1950s the casino had the only restaurant in town and denied service to blacks. Those traveling through were not allowed to stop there for food or rest.

"She helped lead the picket line in Hawthorne that eventually led to the casino changing it's policy," Feemster said. "There were a lot of barriers to be broken down and she was critical to that."

The funeral was last Thursday at Sparks United Methodist Church, where Woodard was a longtime member. She was buried at Mountain View Cemetery.
