OCTOBER 7

1888 - Sargent C. Johnson is born in Boston, Mass. He will be a pioneering artist of the Harlem Renaissance, known for his wood, cast stone, and ceramic sculptures. Among his most famous works will be Forever Free and Mask.

1891 - Archibald John Motley, Jr. is born in New Orleans, LA. He will become one of the more renowned painters of the 1920's and 1930's.

1897 - Elijah Poole is born in Sandersville, Ga. He will become better known as The Honorable Elijah Muhammad, one of the most influential leaders in the Nation of Islam. Poole will be trained by Master Farad Mohammad, founder of the Nation of Islam, and will lead the organization to become the largest African-American movement since Gareveyism.

1934 - LeRoi Jones is born in Newark, NJ. He will be better known as Amiri Baraka, influential playwright, author, and critic of the African-American experience.

1930 - Faith Ringgold is born in New York City. She will become a multimedia artist whose paintings, face masks, fabric and soft sculptures, and quilts will earn her praise for her reaffirmation of African-American women's values and unique perspective.

1941 - Rev. Jeese L. Jackson is born in Greenville, S.C. He will be a civil rights leader and founder of PUSH (People United to Save Humanity) in 1971, an organization that will focus attention on the economic disparity between whites and African-Americans.

Independence Day - Republic of Uganda

1806 - Benjamin Banneker was a self-taught mathematician and builder (at age 21) of the first striking clock in the U.S. An amateur astronomer, Banneker's calculations for solar and lunar eclipses appeared in 29 editions of his almanacs, published from 1792 to 1797.

1823 - Mary Ann Shadd is born in Wilmington, Del. She will become the publisher of Canada's first anti-slavery newspaper, The Provincial Freeman, and the first woman in North America to publish and edit a newspaper.

1929 - Ernest "Dutch" Morial, first black mayor of new Orleans, born in New Orleans, La.

1962 - Uganda acheives its independence from Great Britain.

OCTOBER 10

1899 - J.W. Butts, inventor, receives a patent for a luggage

1901 - Frederick Douglass Patterson is born in Washington, D.C. He will become a veterinarian and founder of the United Negro College Fund.

1917 - Innovative jazz pianist and composer of 'Round Midnight Thelonious Monk is born in Rocky Mount, N.C. Monk will be considered one of the fathers of jazz improvisation and in 1961 will be featured on the cover of Time magazine, only one of three jazz musicians so honored.

1935 - George Gershwin's Porgy and Bess premieres at the Alvin Theater in New York City.

1946 - Dancer and multi-faceted entertainer Ben Vereen is born in Miami, Fla.

1865 - Jamaican national hero Paul Bogle leads a successful protest march to the Morant Bay Courthouse.

1882 - Acclaimed concert pianist, composer, arranger, and choral conductor R. Nathaniel Dett is born in Ontario, Canada.

1919 - Art Blakey is born in Pittsburgh, Penn. Blakey, a azz drummer credited as one of the creators of bebop, will be best known as the founder of the Jazz Messengers. The band will become a proving ground for some of the best modern jazz musicians, including Horace Silver, Hank Mobely, Freddie Hubbard Wayne Shorter, Sonny Rollins, Wynton Marsalis, and Branford Marsalis.

1939 - Coleman Hawkins records his famous "Body and Soul" in New York City.

1980 - Billy Thomas dies of a heart attack in Los Angeles, Calif. He was an actor most notable as the third child to portray Buckwheat in the Our Gang comedies, a role he played in some 80 episodes of the popular film series.

Black stuntworkers claim racial bias

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Minority stuntworkers are accusing Hollywood of discrimination, saying the industry is hiring whites to stand in for black actors such as Eddie Murphy, Samuel Jackson and Louis Gossett

At a news conference last week, several stuntworkers asked viewers to boycott all Viacom products Oct. 8-10. Viacom owns CBS, MTV, VH-1 and Nickelodeon, as well as the Paramount studios and the Blockbuster chain of video-rental stores.

Wayne King Jr., who doubled for Michael Jordan in "Space Jam," said he can count on one hand the number of days he's worked as a stuntman this year.

"When you have paint downs, you're taking jobs from African-Americans," said Marvin Walters, a retired black stuntman. "I don't care what say, this discrimination."

The protest follows the criticism of TV networks for their largely white casting this season. The lack of roles for minorities in Hollywood has been a contentious issue.

Walters estimated that of some 65 black stuntworkers in Hollywood, only 15 work on a regular basis. Walters said"we hold SAG ultimately responsible," referring to the Screen Actors Guild, which represents nearly 96,000 including stuntworkers, nationwide.

Katherine Moore, a SAG spokeswoman, said the guild has an aggressive diversity campaign and has published for the second year a directory called "Stunt Performers of

Walters said a white stuntwoman stood in for the female Asian lead of CBS's Law" "Martial complained over the hiring choices on Paramount's "Shaft," a spin-off of the 1970s TV detective series.

CBS spokesman Chris Endersaid "Martial Law" star Kelly Hu has a regular Asian stuntwoman but that one time the woman didn't want to do a stunt where she had to fall off a cliff.

"Shaft" director and producer John Singleton, who is black, said he simply "hired the best people."

"Any allegations that anyone is being hired on a racial basis is unfounded, totally erroneous and very offensive to me," he said in a statement.
