and talented.

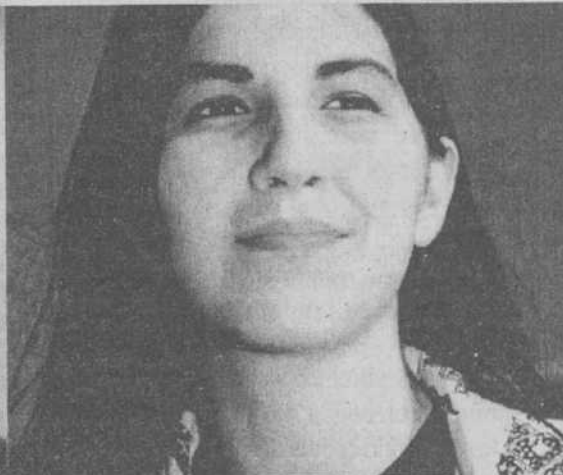
They also publicly gave props to Brent Jones and company, as well they should have, for providing such a great show.
