# **Doolittle sequel funny as first**

Eddie Murphy has established himself lately as 'The King of the Kiddie Movie' in much the same way that Fred MacMurray did for Baby Boomers a couple of generations ago. Mr. Murphy's sassy voicework on Mulan and Shrek helped catapult those animated features to the top of the box-office charts.

Eddie's entertaining remakes of The Nutty Professor and Dr. Doolittle have actually eclipsed the originals, enabling the fab funnyman to establish a couple of franchises in the process.

So Dr. Doolittle 2, his review-proof current offering, ought to be a big box-office hit just based on that built-in audience which rushes out to any Eddie Murphy movie. And I am happy to report that the sequel is silly enough for the more discriminating comedy fan.

Dr. Doolittle, just to remind you, is an eccentric vet who can talk to the animals. And, here, director Steve Carr (Next Friday) decided to up the ante by adding considerably more creatures to the cast, totaling over 250. This works because most of the humor comes from the snappy repartee among the beasts.

The seasoned, off-camera talent lending their voices to the wisecracking animals includes Saturday Night Live alum Norm MacDonald, Cedric the Entertainer (Kingdom Come), Lisa Kudrow (of TV's Friends), Michael Rapaport (Bamboozled), Issac Hayes (South Park), Joey Lauren Davis (Big Daddy), stand-up comedian John Witherspoon, Andy Dick (of TV's News Radio) and Phil Proctor (of Firesign Theater).

In front of the camera it's mostly Murphy, despite stellar support from character actor Kevin Pollak (The Wedding Planner) and Jeffrey Jones, unforgettable as the exasperated principal in Ferris Bueller's Day Off. The Doolittle family is intact with Kristen Wilson (Girl 6) reprising her role as Lisa, Dr. Doolittle's wife, the almost-grown Raven-Symone (of TV's The Cosby Show) returning as Charisse, the doctor's dating-age daughter, while Kyla Pratt (Love & Basketball) is also back as her sister, Maya.

For some reason, probably having to do with profits, every African-American cast has to have a rap star nowadays. Doctor Doolittle's is rapper Lil' Zane (Finding Forrester) who appears, as Charisse's inappropriate love interest. Nonetheless, this movie revolves around the evil developers who want to flatten the forest and pave the Earth. The animals approach Dr. Doolittle who concocts a plan to save the critters.

Thanks to the latest generation of computer-generated special effects, the animals' anthropomorphic acting and lip-synching appear seamless. Taking that for granted, we're easily able to immerse ourselves in the kid-friendly storyline.

Sporting an assortment of colorful, ethnic accents and matching mannerisms, this peaceable kingdom of bears, weasels, dogs, tortoises, raccoons, possums, beavers, rats, squirrels, monkeys, possums, beavers, crocodiles and more help the good Doctor squash the plans of the money-grubbing land-grabbers.

Very Good (3 stars). Rated PG for slapstick violence, which might scare only the youngest of viewers.


Former "Soul Train" host, Melanie Comarcho, has toured with the Queens of Comedy, Maxwell Live '99 and Chris Tucker.
