## Lisa Leslie named 2001 sportswoman of the year



Lisa Leslie, the current WNBA MVP and member of the reigning WNBA Champion Los Angeles Sparks, and Olympic gold medal winner Stacy Dragila, who has set eight pole vaulting world records in the past year, have been named the 2001 Women's Sports Foundation Sportswomen of the Year.

The award, which recognizes individual and team sport athletes for their achievements from August 2000 through July 2001, was presented at the Foundation's 22nd Annual Salute to Women in Sports Awards Dinner at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City on Monday, Oct. 15.

For Leslie, the team award caps off a remarkable year in which she became the first player in WNBA history to be awarded the regular-season MVP, Championship MVP and All-Star MVP. She led her team to its first WNBA Championship and, in the process, became the top player and most recognizable star in the league.

The federal government spent \$98 million on the 1996

Summer Olympics in Atlanta.

The Justice Department will administer a \$4.5 million grant for additional security equipment, while the Defense Department will receive \$20 million for additional military personnel to provide Olympic security.

The additional money will go to expanding the restricted airspace over Olympic venues; add law enforcement personnel at venues, including plain-clothes federal agents; fence in some areas; install more metal detectors and surveillance equipment; and place troops at some buildings, such as food warehouses.
