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them with the necessary technical assistance after contaminated letters were discovered in the United States.

"We don't have the means to check the mail when it comes in and when we send it out. For the moment, our action is limited to providing employees of the postal service with gloves and masks," said Patrice Jean Baptiste, technical director of the Haitian Postal Service.

U.S. authorities have long been concerned about possible export of anthrax from Haiti. In May 1974, the U.S. Bureau of Consumer Protection warned against importing leather items from Haiti.

The bureau said in a press release that products imported from Haiti could be contaminated with anthrax spores.

A communique from the bureau said people possessing objects such as drums, scabbards, wall hangings and rugs should seal them in plastic bags and call officials from their local or state health services.

The warning, in accordance with a directive from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), indicated that American tourists had been exposed to the cutaneous form of anthrax after having purchased drums made of untreated hides in

An analysis of various products containing animal hair imported from Haiti revealed a considerable number had been contaminated by anthrax spores.

On April 19, 1974, the quarantine division of the CDC prohibited the importation of such products. Stores were also notified to pull these items from the shelves.

Anthrax here is generally transmitted by direct contact with spores created by a contaminated animal. This form causes serious cutaneous lesions.

More serious is inhalation anthrax or when the spores enter the digestive tract.

First, let's lay aside the large egos that lead persons to become delusional with the belief that they are self-made men and women. Every successful collective undertaking, be it social, business or waging war, requires a division of labor.

Understanding a need for a division of labor, the next step is to focus on the criminal justice system, economic development and social concerns. Actions in these areas need to focus on defensive actions to protect prior gains, offensive actions to forge ahead on current issues, and development of a database to support a communication alert network.

Building coalitions to consolidate efforts by Blacks, Hispanics, and progressive whites on issues of mutual concerns is important. The primary problem with the criminal justice system is that we do more time for the same crime. Working to eliminate disparity in the sentencing of minority offenders is a task that can be pursued by the Ministerial Alliance.

The Urban Chamber of Commerce and the National Association of Minority Contractors should shoulder the responsibility of advocating equitable economic development opportunities for persons of color.

The Detroit Connection, fraternities and sororities are ideally positioned to highlight the need for educational re-

The Links, a revitalized NAACP, the Southern Nevada Coalition of Concerned Women and veteran groups can assure a social net for black families by monitoring the various governmental agencies charged with meeting the needs of persons requiring a hand-up.

The key role our black elected officials can play is to present a united front, pushing for the enactment of ordinances, statutes and laws that assure fairness. They also need to exercise their influence by placing in government budgets the resources needed to sustain advocacy efforts by grassroots organizations. While there can be no doubt about the need for a plan for black family survival and progress, what are the Vegas odds that we will hold a summit to implement a plan-1:1, 100:1, 1,000:1, or infiinity:1 (not ever)? What odds would you be willing to give that black folks will get it together here in "Sin City?"

It makes no sense now to run the welfare program, originally intended to counterbalance economic downturns by enabling those left out of the workforce to maintain some level of purchasing power, with a time clock. "Turn off" the time clock and restore welfare's intended economic function during next year's reauthorization debate.

If we're to stablize the economy, which means encouraging high consumer demand, we must provide relief to those facing the greatest risk of economic hardship.

This is the time for all of us to share the economic sacrifice. Putting the greatest burden on low-income communities is not just morally wrong. It doesn't make economic sense.
