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tion, not acts that suggest we are anti-white.

Our biggest problem is buying into the belief that our votes do not count. Here again, a little history is in order. I am not going to refer to the mess that took place in Florida in November 2000, but to something that took place back in 1886 and is the main reason we have been catching hell ever since then.

In the election of 1886, Tilden, a democrat, won the popular vote but was one vote short of having the needed 185 electoral votes to be elected president. Hayes finished a close second in the popular vote and had 169 electoral votes. Hayes, understanding his plight and the sentiment of the South, cut a deal!

In exchange for the support of southern democrats in the electoral college, he agreed to four conditions, namely:

Removal of federal troops stationed in the South; placement of a southerner in his cabinet; giving control of federal patronage jobs to the local yokels, and placing under the control of the local yokels the letting of federal public works projects.

We should all know the consequences for blacks from this deal. The most tragic being that between 1886 and the mid-1950s, over four thousand blacks were lynched in the South. Folks, if more of us understood what is at stake in any and all elections at the local, county, state and federal levels, we would make more of an effort to "drag our lazy butts to the polls."

cultural divide is enhanced and, therefore, the foundation of the political differences and alienation is maintained. There must be a breakthrough in the nature of the American commitment in order for the perception of people in the Middle East about America to change.

How is the fundamental commitment of the U.S. to Israel rewarded when the Sharon government has all but thumbed its nose at U.S., which provides billions of dollars in aid to that country each year? Powell has had occasion to ask Sharon to come back to the peace table, only to be embarrassed by the Israeli leader's refusal to do so, warning America not to push too hard. Does the U.S. really have so little leverage over Israel it cannot induce it to stop the expansion of settlements?

The Bush administration often refers to the report of the committee headed by former Sen. George Mitchell released earlier this year. Even that report abounds in word games abound relating to whether the expansion of new West Bank settlements should be totally prohibited, or whether such expansion is a result of the natural growth of those who are already there.

In any case, it is clear there will be no resolution to this issue-or others-without a much stronger investment of the U.S. stating a position that is actually even handed and then placing some discipline behind it.

In this speech, Powell's credibility was also invested in his leadership of the project of nation building-a concept President Bush rejected during the campaign. He has promised to help rebuild Afghanistan and to shore up Pakistan economically, acknowledging there can be no reduction of tensions without closing the gap in social status between Western and Middle Eastern peoples.

However, there is a grave risk that the Powell may be hung out to dry because of the difficulty of making peace in the context of the pursuit of a war policy by the Bush faction. The cynical person would say this looks like a version "good cop, bad cop" if it weren't so obvious that the bad cop in this scenario will undo everything that the good cop is attempting to accomplish, as flawed as it might be.
