Hopkins explains that our community creates millions of dollars of wealth, but fails to parlay this money into a lifetime income: He makes the distinction. "The rich buy assets; the poor buy luxuries."

The struggle with economic empowerment is compared to a hamster on an exercise wheel. "The faster he runs the faster he has to run to keep up with himself, going nowhere fast," Hopkins wrote.

Throughout his book, Hopkins takes a hard-nosed approach to some of Black America's recurring problems. This book is sure to cause numerous ripples in all of its readers' minds.
