

Nevadan named Miss Black U LV Classic set By John T. Stephens III to excite city

Sentinel-Voice Elizabeth Muto, UNLV graduate and Nevada native, captured the Miss Black USA pageant title, beating out 40 other competitors for the crown last month in Miami.

She is the first Nevada resident to win the crown. The 23-year-old Miss Black USA will embark on a 100-city tour to promote her message and garnish support for her cause.

She is a supporter of "Fight For The Music" which benefits music and arts in public schools.

She is involved in Make-A-Wish Foundation and Candle Lighters and was a public speaker for DARE (Drug and Alcohol Responsibility Education) and SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving).

Elijah Muhammad's son to focus on productivity

CHICAGO (NNPA)-Imam W. Deen Mohammed, the Black Muslim spiritual leader who over three decades transformed how American Blacks practice the religion, has resigned as head of the American Society of Muslims.

Mohammed said he will continue to represent and guide Black Muslims and direct his ministry, The Mosque Cares, but would no longer lead the society, the main organization representing his movement.

"I'm getting ready...to do more, to be more productive and to contribute to the good life of the believers," Mohammed said recently at the start of his keynote speech at the society's annual convention.

Mohammed, who will turn 70 in October, the day before had privately informed his movement's imams, or prayer leaders, that he would step

down.

His national representative, Imam Earl Abdulmalik Mohammed, announced the decision before last Sunday's keynote speech.

Some audience members gasped, then applauded and cheered for him. Former heavyweight champion Muhammad Ali, who is Muslim, attended but did not speak.

"I don't know about you, but when I told the imams about my resignation...a big burden went off my back," W. Deen Mohammed joked to the crowd.

He would not comment further on his resignation. (See Imam, Page 4)

CBC selects right-wing Fox over black networks for big debate

WASHINGTON (NNPA)-Many people were surprised that Tuesday night's presidential debate, sponsored by the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC), was aired on a Right-wing network that frequently opposes everything that the organization stands for.

"FOX has their record of being Right-wing and even racist where Blacks are concerned. And so, the contradiction is that they [CBC] would choose FOX to do this. But the other thing is that FOX saw a moment of opportunity themselves to cover their behinds. They can always say, 'Well, we hosted the Congressional Black Caucus," says Ronald Walters, a political science professor at the University of Maryland-College Park. "We have no permanent friends. We have no permanent enemies. We have only permanent interests, Cummings says, quoting former U.S. Rep. William L. Clay (D-Mo.). "Our interest is that we invigorate the African-American vote and that people have an opportunity for the first time during this campaign season to see a live debate and FOX offered to do it."

works also wanted to air the debate but were rejected.

"Because we have such an excellent relationship with the CBC, we put forth a strong proposal, in our eyes, and a competitive proposal," says Michael Lewellen, vice president of corporate communications for Black Entertainment Television (BET). "We went on site visits. We put together a budget and we came in tandem with our news partner, CBS. But for reasons, which certainly I would defer to your sources (See Caucus, Page 3)
