A panel made up of members of the healthcare delivery industry as well as local policymakers is being formed for the afternoon session of the Health Disparities Symposium hosted by the University of Nevada Cooperative Extension's REACH 2010, (Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health). The Health Disparities conference will take place Saturday, September 20th at Nevada Partners. The morning session which begins at 9:00 AM will feature addresses by Dr. Maulana Karenga, Professor of African American Studies at University of California, Long Beach and creator of the internationally recognized Kwanzaa celebration and Dr. Rodney Hood, the past president of the National Medical Association, the 100 year old medical association representing African American physicians. Owens said that positive images of Black women every few years in mainstream pageants were not enough to offset other media images of Black women in scantily clad, booty-shaking videos.

The pageant was held at the Radisson Miami Hotel in Miami on Friday and Saturday, Aug. 22 and 23.
