The evening entrée was Emmenthal Crusted Chicken Paillard with Capers, fresh asparagus, long-stemmed carrots and truffled mashed potatoes with fresh baked Parisian bread. The desert was Crème Brulee with seasonal berries.

The room soon filled with the song styling of Janis Carter. Having spent five years in Paris, her beautiful French accent was theme perfect. Accompanied by talented musician Woody Woods and band, Janis began her show with classic hit "Ability to Swing," sharing experiences of her Parisian days she segued into the night's theme, "April in Paris."
