Sticks, stones obscure issue

"From my perspective, there is one last plantation in America, and it's called the Democratic Party."

From the mouth of a rightwing, racially opportunistic ideologue like Alan Keyes or an inveterate Republican propagandist like Armstrong Williams you might expect such incendiary vitriol, but not from a Republican Clark County Commissioner Lynette Boggs McDonald who has garnered a bipartisan support during her years of public service and who has generally avoided partisan bickering. The statement created the expected mini, media-stoked brouhaha, splitting an already fractious Black community and (re)igniting political fissures—Black Democrats calling for her head; Republicans amen-ning their GOP sister.

But as smart as she is, you have to question what Boggs McDonald-who usually displays an uncanny sense of reason for a politician-was thinking by choosing the word "plantation." She must have known about its racial connotation. Perhaps more than any remnant of the U.S. slavery era, plantations reprise the most disconcerting memories. Of brutal beatings. Of forced rape. Of backbreaking field work. Of racial separatism (house vs. field slaves). In trying to make the point that Democrats have long taken the Black vote for granted-which is true-Boggs McDonald instead stirred a partisan hornets' nest. Yes, Democrats may assume Black support as a birthright, but GOP blatantly treats it as an afterthought. Credit Boggs McDonald for being courageous enough to highlight a political truth, but discredit her for 1) failing to leaven her comments by lowlighting her party's abysmal treatment of Black America 2) failing to choose her words more wisely (she told the Review-Journal she was unaware that Keyes has also used the plantation analogy) and 3) airing discord in the media and doing so now.

Though controversial at any time, her words are infinitely more so in this racially charged political climate, a climate in which Democrats allege a vast GOP conspiracy to suppress the Black vote, fears stoked by the disenfranchisement of scores of Black ex-felons throughout the country during the 2000 presidential election (one estimate tabbed the figure at 1.9 million Blacks). As the clock ticks toward election day out comes new evidence that the GOP wants a repeat of 2000.

For instance: Last year in Pennsylvania, men with clipboards bearing official-looking insignias of the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms and the Drug Enforcement Administration were dispatched to Black neighborhoods and asked prospective voters for identification; in 2002, fliers were distributed in Black communities in Louisiana that read, "Vote!!! Bad Weather? No problem!!! If the weather is uncomfortable on election day (Saturday, December 7) remember you can wait and cast your ballot on Tuesday, December 10;" the Louisiana Republican Party admitted in a separate incident to paying Black youth \$75 to hold signs in Black neighborhoods that appeared to discourage folks in the African-American community from voting.

"The Long Shadow of Jim Crow: Voter Intimidation and Suppression in America Today," a joint report from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the People for the American Way Foundation, cites more examples of allegedly GOP-inspired vote suppression: armed private guards, off-duty cops, creditors and fake election workers threatening minority voters; signs at the polling places warning of penalties for "voter fraud," "non-citizen" voting, or illegally urging support for a candidate; poll workers "helping" voters fill out their ballots, and instructing them on how to vote; criminal tampering with voter registration rolls and records; fliers and radio ads containing false information about where, when and how to vote; internal memos expressing an explicit goal to suppress Black voter turnout.

Boggs McDonald has to know that her party has treated Blacks infinitely worse. If the Dems represent the last plantation, then what's that make the GOP?
