The Committed 100 Men began in Las Vegas, Nevada in 1990. The organization is dedicated to providing "positive messages" for African-American males. They offer examples of productive alternatives in an environment where gang involvement, drug trafficking, and counterproductive sexual behavior exist. The goals of the C100 Men include emphasizing strong morals, the benefits of hard work, and the

family unit as a solid founda-

According to Henry Herbert, the program coordinator, "The organization has been in existence for the last 13 years making a difference in the lives of young men. Through our mentoring efforts, and Rites of Passage program, we teach young men to appreciate their life, culture, the importance of an education, conflict resolution, and coping skills. Many of these students we serve come from low income,

benefit greatly from the work of this organization and the dedication of its volunteers."

He added, "This community event is being brought to the community specifically to educate, provoke action, to seek solutions and solicit the commitment from professional men who consider themselves role-models for our young males and other youth in our community and becoming mentors for our organization. In particular, this community event is to recruit

The organization serves approximately 60 students per school year in the middle schools. Two thirteen-week cycle programs are offered, once during the fall semester and once in the spring.
