King breakfast speaker: Ignore divisiveness

A breakfast concluding the weekend celebration of the Martin Luther King, Jr., holiday was held Monday at Nevada Partners located at 710 West Lake Mead Blvd in North Las Vegas.

The event acknowledged the work of the committee hosting the event, presented awards to the participants of the 24th annual Martin Luther King Jr. parade held Saturday, and gave thanks to the many supporters and sponsors of the entire weekend celebration.

The breakfast guest speaker was Dora LaGrande, Board Chairman of the MLK parade committee. In her comments, LaGrande thanked the parade committee members; Power 88 announcer Galaxy Glenn, KCEP-FM; City of Las Vegas Councilman Lawrence Weekly, Ward 5; and Senator Steven Horsford, District 4, for their tireless efforts that helped make these events successful. She proceeded to make reference to the infamous speech by Willie Lynch and his great-grandson Willie Lynch III on slavery and entrapment of African-Americans by this society.

She read from Lynch's chilling words: "In my bag here, I have a fool-proof method of controlling your black slaves... I have outlined a number of differences among the slaves; and I take these differences and make them bigger. I use fear, distrust, and envy for control purposes. These methods have worked on my modest plantation in the West Indies and it will work throughout the South. Take this simple little list of differences, think about them. On top of my list is 'age' but it is there only because it starts with an 'a', the second is 'color' (or

Now that you have a list of differences, I shall give you an outline of action, but before that, I shall assure you that distrust is stronger than trust, and envy is stronger than adulation, respect or admiration."

LaGrande continued her message reciting what "his (Lynch's) great-grandson" said in 2002: "We will focus on the current methods of containment that they (Blacks) use on themselves: ignorance, greed, and selfishness. The ignorance of blacks is the primary weapon of containment. A great man once said, 'the best way to hide something from a black is to put it in a book.' This statement is so true. We currently live in an information age... as long as we continue to publish books for our benefit and keep books, computers and the Internet out (of) they are fools."

The audience, primarily African-Americans, listened intently and showed visible reactions. One guest described the prevailing crowd reaction to the profound reading in a word: "aghast."
