Roy Jones Jr. was a noshow Tuesday at the Manhattan dance club, leaving Tarver to promote their "Tarver-Jones 3" fight scheduled for Oct. 1 on HBO.

"We're getting a 50-50 split, but I'm doing all the leg work," said Tarver, who had to pose for photos with a fist aimed at a placard bearing Jones' name. "I've got to talk to my agent and restructure."

Promoters did announce the venue for the live payper-view event - the St. Pete Times Forum in Tarver's hometown of Tampa, Fla.

Late-night negotiations for the venue supposedly kept Jones training in Pensacola, Fla., rather than taking an early morning flight to New York.

"He wanted to focus more on training," said Brad Jacobs, a Jones adviser. "Every fight is important, but this fight is brutally important. then, he's been moonlighting

looks to reclaim his light heavyweight supremacy. Tarver registered a devas-

tating second-round knockout against Jones in May 2004 to keep the WBC and IBO titles.

Jones won the first bout in a close 12-round decision in November 2003 to win the championships.

Tarver, 23-3 with 18 knockouts, scored a onepunch knockout of Jones in the second fight. He landed only seven total, but a lefthanded shot rocked Jones at 1:41 of the second round.

"It was one of those perfect punches," Tarver said. "Will I be fortunate enough to hit him with that punch again? I don't know ... I think it will be a more competitive fight."

Jones, 49-3 with 38 KOs, lost to Glen Johnson just four months after that fight. Since


Adu will be out for a month with injuries

WASHINGTON (AP) - D.C. United's Freddy Adu is expected to miss two to four weeks after an MRI exam Tuesday showed he has a sprained ligament in his right knee.

Adu was injured Saturday in the first half of United's 3-2 victory against the Chicago Fire. He tried to slide between two defenders and collided with an opponent.

"We're encouraged by the news today that Freddy's injury is indeed minor," club technical director Dave Kasper said. "He has already begun the rehabilitation process, and we look forward to having him back in uniform in a matter of weeks."

The 16-year-old Adu has two goals and five assists in 16 games this season for D.C. United, which is 9-6-5 and tied for third place in the Eastern Conference.




