Beauty school grows by leaps

The groundbreaking for Expertise Cosmetology Institute, Nevada's first Blackowned cosmetology school, took place last month at 1911 Stella Lake St. in Enterprise Park near Martin Luther King and Lake Mead boulevards in the city's historic Westside.

"I feel great. God is good and we're blessed to be here on the grounds of the cosmetology institute," Gwen Braimoh said.

Braimoh, founder and executive director of the Expertise School of Beauty, is very excited about the school's future location, new name and expansion into the new insti-

In comparison to the school's current location in Nucleus Plaza on the east side along "H" street at West Owens, the institute will be nearly double the size, from 6,100 to 11,000 square-feet.

The city of Las Vegas is donating the one-acre land site needed for the building.

"I'm very excited about this project. I'm happy for Gwen [Braimoh] and the Expertise family," Ward 5 Councilmen Lawrence Weekly said.

Enterprise Park, which is a 75-acre mixed businesspark, has been established

since 1995. It currently includes private and governmental buildings, and Weekly said "[the businesses] have had a positive impact on the community."

With the new expansion and move, Expertise will be licensed by the Nevada State Board of cosmetology as a training institute. This will give them the option to offer financial aid for students who qualify.

The school's students provide hair care, nail care and other cosmetology services to the public for a reduced rate and under the guidance of instructors. Currently, student enrollment is 42 and they have rotating graduations. With the additional space, the staff and student population will increase, which will allow the school to extend their hours, according to Braimoh.

"We're going to be offering evening classes [once the new school opens]," Braimoh said.

"[The staff] will double from ten to twenty [faculty members]," she said, adding, "Our goal is to triple our enrollment to about 120 partici-

In addition to cosmetology, hair design and manicurist instruction, Expertise will offer other curriculum choices for students.

"Here at the new facility, we're offering a new skin care program called esthetician and a teacher training program that will train cosmetologist to become instructors," Braimoh explained.

In addition to the institute, Enterprise Park's new tenants will include a job training facility, the Urban Chamber of Commerce, and a major, yet unnamed, grocery store anchor being sought to attract customers to the park.

The new building to house the Expertise Institute is scheduled to open the second week in May.

School programs honor successes

The annual TRIO/Gear Up Day was held in the Rio Hotel Casino Pavilion Saturday. McNair post-baccalaureate scholarship program — one of only a few programs in the nation with a mission to prepare minority students for post-graduate doctoral programs.

TRIO/Gear Up are both programs under the Center for Academic and Educational Outreach or CAEO umbrella. The center is based in UNLV's Student Support Services Building and primarily assists students from low-income, first-generation and disadvantaged populations. The mission of CAEO is to provide traditional and innovative educational opportunities to a diverse community through targeted services and research that promote personal success.

County Commissioner Yvonne Atkinson Gates serves as deputy executive director for marketing and communications for CAEO. She explained the idea behind the

"This is our opportunity to recognize individuals that were either former Gear Up or TRIO participants who achieved a lot... Our goal is to make sure we get kids in school, keep them in school and to make sure they go on to college and achieve their personal dreams..." She added, "Our goals are primarily focused on education and helping individuals to attain their dreams of becoming successful and also getting an education."
