Professor links African and Latin cultures

By Sandra Isley Special to Sentinel-Voice WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (NNPA) - Students at Bolton Elementary School in Winston-Salem received a global lesson on African in-

fluence in Latin cultures as

part of a Black History Month program.

Recently, Krishauna Hines, a Spanish professor at Salem College, gave an Afro-Latino presentation to Bolton's Spanish classes. The presentation evolved from the two degrees she's earned in Spanish.

"I wanted to find a connection with my culture and what I was studying," said Hines, who is African-American. "In the spirit of Black History Month, I looked for a way to globalize the discussion so that it goes beyond the borders of the United States and is inclusive of the African Diaspora."

A familiar connection to African history in this country and Latin America wasn't

Even though her message is one of commonality, Hines has a greater reason for educating others about the link between the two ethnic

Hines said, "The purpose of this presentation is to let African-Americans and others know that they need to become more marketable in a global economy."

Through a slide presentation, music and other forms of media, Hines showed not only the influence of African culture on Latinos, but also the influence that Afro-Latins have on American culture. The students went into a frenzy as she highlighted the lives of Afro-Latin celebrities. Some of the names in-

Students were very responsive to the presentation as some played the tambourine, drums and other instruments, while others enjoyed watching the big screen.

"My favorite part was when she showed the famous Afro-Latins," said fifthgrader Da'Sha Smith. "Some of them, I didn't know about their heritage or where they came from. I got to learn more about the famous

Elijah Fifth-grader Romero enjoyed a different segment of the show. "I like when they showed where slavery ended because when I learned about what they used

to do to them, I felt sorry for them," said Romero.

Another lesson that Romero learned was how diversified one race can be. "I've learned that there could be more than one descendant in a Latino. There can be White, Black or even Asian in their bloodline."

Spanish teacher Angie Nelson-Pico, who was responsible for Hines' visit, jumped at the opportunity to have Hines speak to the stu-

"I want them to realize the African influence throughout the Americas, not just the United States," said Pico.

In her presentation, Hines hoped to bridge an educational gap beyond the language barrier. "I felt if they found a connection with the culture, they may see that it's more important than just learning about the language," she said. "We cannot separate

the language from the culture. They are inextricably

linked." Hines, oftentimes speaking in Spanish, explained in great detail the influence that Africans had in Latin America, not just in music,

food and dance, but in other areas as well. "I want people to know that their influences ran deeper than that," said Hines. "African influences can be found in areas of science, exploration and architecture."
