## Juneteenth Festival honors emancipation

The sixth annual Juneteenth Festival will be held Saturday, June 17, at the Sammy Davis Jr. Plaza located on the western end of the grounds at Lorenzi Park, 3333 W. Washington Ave at

Twin Lakes Drive. The festival will begin at 4:00 p.m. and end at 9:00 p.m.

The event is free, open to the public, and all ages are permitted to attend. There will be guest speakers, live entertainment, cultural and educational activities, story tellers and a section with informational and merchant booths, said the head of the Las Vegas Juneteenth Committee, Diane Pollard. She also serves as director of marketing for Rainbow Medical Centers, the founding co-sponsor of the event.

The annual festival fundraiser will benefit Rainbow Dreams Academy, a charter elementary school set to open in 2007, according to Pollard who explained that the school "will focus on helping at-risk students."

It will also support the Kit Carson Elementary afterschool and summer youth programs, she said. Both of these programs are supported by the Anthony L. Pollard Foundation, which is a charitable organization that raises money to improve the lives of community youth by providing educational assistance and opportunities. "I think it helps communication and [allows] people to embrace different [cultures]," Pollard said.

Juneteenth started as a celebration among African-Americans living and working in Galveston, Texas, following the news that they were emancipated from slavery. June 19, 1865, is the day on which Major General Gordon Granger and his

An addition to the work of the local chapter is its attempt to reach out to female students in the middle schools of Clark County. They have launched initiatives to educate and inform these individuals early in life about being responsible for their health as it relates to breast cancer and how to take precautionary measures to guard against any potential dangers before contracting this disease.

Recent studies have shown that African-American women contract breast cancer at an earlier age than do most other women, so it important to educate our young women about this deadly disease.

This effort will also help these young women to encourage their mothers and grandmothers to get a yearly breast exam, Pap smear, and mammogram.

Jeannie Beatty, president of the Las Vegas chapter of Sisters Network Inc., is a 16year breast cancer survivor. She spoke about the fundraising efforts, the work of the organization and what it means for African-American women.

Beatty said, "This is our fourth annual fundraising walk this year, and the walk is an attempt to make the community aware of breast cancer [and the prevention, treatment

and support] for African-American women. Our organization is nationwide, and we recently opened a new [international] chapter in the [United Kingdom]."

"It was wonderful today to have the support of the Las Vegas Fire Department and the students from West Prep because they brought some energy to the march along with bringing people out of their houses to the fences and the street to see what was going on," she added.

"We hope that many of the people observing the march this year will join us next year. We passed out literature about breast cancer to make a difference in the lives of African-American women. This is a silent and deadly disease."

Beatty also indicated that the survival rate for members of the organization locally and nationwide is improving because of the education that they are able to provide to women at meetings and forums along with the advantage of receiving breast exams, mammograms, and medical treatments early on. However, she also said that more African-American women are dying-not from the onset of the disease, but from the lack of proper medical treatment of the disease. So, they encourage African-American women concerned about or suffering from this disease to contact the organization.

The organization hosts a monthly meeting on the third Friday of the month at Victory Missionary Baptist church, located at 500 West Monroe, at 7:00 p.m. For more information, call 648-3410.
