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## Prince begins reign at Rio

International rock star and African-American music icon, Prince, publicly unveiled his new restaurant and opened his new nightclub in the Rio Hotel and Casino. Both the club and restaurant are named after Prince's newly released album, "3121," an album whose title meaning has not yet been revealed.

The restaurant, officially called 3121 Jazz Cuisine, is an elaborately decorated and visually appealing one, serving a variety of upscale five-course meals, all created and overseen by experienced executive chef, Lena Morgan. The mood of the restaurant is quaint and romantic, featuring a candlelit, jazz-infused setting.

On any given night, the restaurant will likely be filled with Las Vegas socialites and entertainment personalities. Comedian George Wallace, "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous" Robin Leach, and Councilman Lawrence Weekly were all present at the preview of the jazz restaurant last Wednesday.

The 3121 club will surely become a popular after-hours spot, open at 10 p.m., Wednesday through Saturday to patrons 21 and over. The club will provide a wide variety of live musical entertainment at a starting cover charge of the enigmatic \$31.21 on weekdays, but it will increase to \$125.00 on Fridays and Saturdays—the nights that Prince is scheduled to perform.

The reservation-only restaurant opens at 5 p.m. daily and employs an enthusiastic wait staff.

Not only will customers be attracted to the meticulous décor and sophisticated dishes, they will be thoroughly entertained by the father-and-son jazz duo, Ghalib & Jihad Ghallab Xperience. The talented pianist and drummer play contemporary blues, jazz ballads, standards and familiar soulful tunes of yesteryear.

The club consists of a spotlight-lit dance floor, scaled seating, an intricate DJ booth, wall-to-wall big screen televisions projecting various music videos, old and new.

The stage is positioned to the rear of the dance floor and spacious enough to accommodate Prince, twin back-up singers, an auxiliary guitarist, and drummer.

And one can expect to pay an upscale price for drinks at 3121's bar, located on the back wall of the club. According to special events producers and national entertainment providers AEG Live, both the concept of the restaurant and the nightclub were exclusive to Prince.

Explaining why the Rio Hotel and Casino is his Las Vegas home, the artist's representatives replied, "Because the Rio has a lot of purple. And you know Prince loves purple," adding, "Las Vegas is the entertainment capital of the world. Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin, Wayne Newton — they all performed here. And Prince would love to be amongst a group of great entertainers to steadily perform in Las Vegas."

There are few entertainers that match the high-energy of Prince, and for two nights every week, visitors and Las Vegas residents can witness that musical energy. There will be other artists featured at 3121, but no names have

been disclosed. Wednesday nights will feature special guest performances by friends of the music legend. Thursday nights will feature a Latin feel. Fridays and Saturdays, club-goers will likely be on their toes, as Prince is prone to spontaneity and loves to surprise his audiences.

Even on nights when Prince is not scheduled to perform, he may show up. "Who knows what will happen," said AEG Live representatives.

Although Prince didn't speak much with the public, he was present at the preview event to give a taste of what guests should expect on those highly-anticipated Friday and Saturday nights at 3121. After the media relations representatives concluded, the curtains rose, and the man who has fascinated fans for decades stroked his orangeand-white electric guitar. His selections included "Black Sweat," from his new 3121 album and the infamous "Purple Rain," his 1984 double Grammy Award-winning album.

While crowds love the new Prince, they worship the old one. After plucking the first string, fans recognized it leading to "Purple Rain" and responded lively.

"Purple rain, purple rain," the 48-year-old sang. "Thank you all for showing up tonight. I hope you all enjoy yourselves here and help make this club a success," he said, while still striking chords on his pastel-colored guitar.

unparalleled success in his
career: touring worldwide,
acting and directing, achieving Grammy Award winning
success, and mastering an
amazing two dozen instruments.

Now, the musical genius known as Prince, the Artist Formerly Known as Prince, (represented by an unpronounceable symbol which combined the symbol for male and female) can add club manager, restaurant proprietor and Las Vegas entertainer to his résumé.
