Farrakhan now out of hospital

CHICAGO (NNPA) – Min. Louis Farrakhan was released from a five-week hospital stay recently following a major surgical procedure, according to spokespersons for the minister.

"He was in the hospital for five weeks," explained Min. Ishmael, national assistant to Farrakhan, who moderated the Web broadcast to various mosques.

"I'm happy to announce to the Nation of the Islam and all of the wonderful people who prayed for him that he was released and is out of the hospital and at home," he said.

In addition to the care from his doctors, Farrakhan was under the constant and continued care from his daughter and nurse, Fatima Farrakhan Muhammad, who had been

bordering Green Valley.

"We're celebrating the Buffalo Soldiers during Black History Month, and the soldiers will be there in complete uniforms both Friday and Saturday. We will have seven different artists who will have portraits conveying the lives of the Buffalo Soldiers on display at the gallery," Lee said.

She said the gallery is "excited about the event."

"As an artist, I have always been interested in the activities of the Buffalo Soldiers. We welcome the opportunity to honor them," added Lee, who has several of her own works in tribute to the legendary Army veterans on permanent display.

Gallery Curator Andre Hines said, "It's surprising how many people don't know about the history [of the Buffalo Soldiers]. It's good to have something to keep their history going."

The Buffalo Soldiers have a rich legacy of service to the country. In July of 1866, according to the International Museum of the Horse, Congress passed legislation establishing two cavalry and four infantry regiments; the mounted regiments were known as the 9th and 10th Cavalries.

These units soon were nicknamed the Buffalo Soldiers by the Cheyenne and Comanche Indians because of the similarity between the hair of the soldiers and the coat of the buffalo. The soldiers originally served as members of the United States Colored Troops that served in the Civil War before being reassigned to regiments, primarily in the western U.S., which were comprised of only African-Americans.

The Greater Las Vegas Area Chapter of the Buffalo Soldiers 9th and 10th Horse Calvary, formed in 2004, consists of 25 members. Since 2005 it is among 29 units established as certified chapters throughout the country under the national organization. Chapter President Sam Armstrong said he is honored at being included in the gallery's program this year.

"Ms. Annie Lee contacted us a few months ago stating that she wanted to honor the Buffalo Soldiers. We met, sat down with eight artists, and began putting the project together. This will be the first time that the local chapter has been honored here in such a way as this."

It is a group deserving of honor, but not only for their military service.

The soldiers were key pioneers in the U.S. Westward Expansion. The Buffalo Soldiers were assigned duties that included protecting stage and mail routes; building and maintaining forts; subduing Mexican revolutionaries, hostile Native Americans, outlaws and rustlers; along with evicting White settlers that were attempting to relocate on protected land granted to Native American tribes.

The Buffalo Soldiers faced many adversaries while carrying out their assigned orders, among them were Geronimo, Sitting Bull, Skinya, Nana, Victorio, Lone Wolf, Billy the Kid, and Pancho Villa. Also, equally important but lesser known, the unit explored and mapped vast areas of the Southwest and strung hundreds of miles of telegraph lines.

They endured fierce prejudice from White officers and enlisted soldiers, along with prejudice from

PHOENIX (AP) - Charles Barkley said Monday that he won "about \$700,000" gambling in Las Vegas over the weekend.

"That was all profit (from) blackjack, and I bet on the Super Bowl. I had the Colts," Barkley said in an interview with Phoenix television station KTVK.

Barkley did not say how much be bet on Sunday's game.

In an ESPN interview in May 2006, Barkley estimated that he'd lost about \$10 million gambling over the years. He said Monday that he lost \$2.5 million "in a six-hour period" one night last year.


